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AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCES ADOPTING A NEW CHAPTER OF THE GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER, TO BE KNOWN AS CHAPTER 68 OF THE GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER

THE CITY OF ROCHESTER ORDAINS:

I. That the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester, as presently amended, be further amended, by adding to Title IV – Traffic Code thereof, a new Chapter, said Chapter to be known as Chapter 68 of the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester and entitled "Distribution of Items To and From Motor Vehicles", said Chapter 67 to provide as follows:

"CHAPTER 68

DISTRIBUTION OF ITEMS TO AND FROM MOTOR VEHICLES

68.1 Intent of Ordinances.

This Ordinance is intended to provide for the free flow of motor vehicle traffic on roadways in the City. The City Council finds that persons who distribute any item to, receive any item from, or exchange any item with, the occupant of a motor vehicle upon a Roadway present a threat to the free and safe flow of motor vehicle traffic. By this Ordinance, the City Council intends to promote the health, safety and welfare of the citizens traveling by vehicle in the City.

68.2 Definitions.

For purposes of this Chapter, the following definitions apply:

- (a) <u>Pass/Passing</u>: Distributing any item to, receiving any item from, or exchanging any item with the occupant of a motor vehicle that is located in the Roadway.
- (b) <u>Roadway</u>. All public roads open to motorized vehicles within the City. This definition excludes private roads and private property. This definition also excludes areas in which parking is permitted in the City.
- (c) <u>Item</u>. Any physical object.

68.3 Prohibition of Roadway.

It shall be unlawful to violate any of the prohibitions set forth below in the City.

- (a) No person shall knowingly distribute any item to, receive any item from, or exchange any item with the occupant of any motor vehicle when the vehicle is located in the Roadway.
- (b) This Ordinance shall not apply to the distribution, receipt or exchange of any item with the occupant of a motor vehicle on private property or in a permitted parking area.
- (c) This Ordinance shall not apply to any law enforcement officer acting in the scope of his/her official duties.
- (d) This Ordinance shall not apply to the distribution, receipt or exchange of any item with the occupant of a motor vehicle located in the roadway in order to assist the occupant after a motor vehicle accident, with a disabled motor vehicle or where the occupant is experiencing a medical emergency.

68.4 Penalty.

A person found in violation of this section shall be guilty of a violation and may be fined not more than \$500.00.

68.5 <u>Severability.</u>

If any provision of this section is declared invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions shall be severable and shall continue in full force and effect."

II. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

SUMMARY STATEMENT

The City of Rochester receives federal grant funding through the Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) program, which is administered through the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD). As part of this funding process, the City must submit a Five-Year Consolidated Action Plan to HUD that outlines its proposed uses of the grants received. HUD requires two public hearings at which members of the public can provide input into the process of identifying areas of need and potential projects to be included in the Five-Year Consolidated Action Plan. This meeting will be the first of the two required meetings.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Allow the Community Development Coordinator to present an overview of the CDBG program and the Five-Year Consolidated Action Plan process and to solicit public input.

First Public Meeting Regarding Five-Year Consolidated Plan for FY 2015-2020

The City of Rochester receives federal grant funding through the Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) program, which is administered through the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD). As part of this funding process, the City must submit a Five-Year Consolidated Action Plan to HUD that outlines its proposed uses of the grants received. The Five-Year Consolidated Plan outlines the City of Rochester's identified priorities and areas of need for community development, housing, and assistance to low and moderate income residents of the City. It is developed with input from members of the public, City officials, and community stakeholders such as non-profits providing services to City residents and local businesses.

Projects funded during the FY 2010-2015 grant cycle include:

- Housing weatherization program for low and moderate income residents
- Assistance to regional homeless shelters
- Mental health care support
- Programs for socioeconomically disadvantaged youth

Projects under preliminary consideration for the FY 2015-2020 grant cycle include:

- Reconstruction of dilapidated school sidewalks
- Youth substance abuse prevention and deterrence program
- Installation of a rooftop heating/cooling unit for the City library
- Reconstruction and repair of the Hanson Pines Skateboard Park
- Installation of bicycle rack parking in key downtown locations




Vital Statistics

The above Variance was <u>Approved</u> as presented at the Zoning Board of Adjustment's November 13, 2014 meeting with the following criteria: The variance will not be contrary to the public interest because: it will not increase congestion in the streets. The spirit of the ordinance is observed because: it will not negatively impact health and the general welfare. Substantial justice is done because, if granted, the benefit to this individual applicant, outweighs any harm to the community as a whole. The value of surrounding properties will not be diminished because: it will not generate levels of noise, light, activity or traffic that are significantly different from that which currently exists.

Code Compliance Deficiencies

There are up to four steps of actions being used to deal with complaints/ violations: The first being verbal contact. The next method is a written notice of violation. This consists of a notice that is mailed first class as well as certified mail giving the property owner or violator a detailed description of the deficiencies and a date to make the appropriate corrections. The requested date depends on the time that is considered reasonable for the requested action that needs corrected, for instance, a minor repair to a fence may warrant a couple of days, while replacing an entire fence may require a few weeks. If there has been no contact made by the recipient of the notice, a follow up inspection is then made. If the violation(s) still exist, a second notice of violation is mailed with a new correction date on it. This process is then followed through again with a final notice. If the violation has still not been corrected after these notices, the paper work is turned over to Attorney Grossman for legal/court action to be taken. If the violation was a time sensitive issue, such as trash piling up, we would skip the second notice and go straight to a final notice to help expedite the process.

Rochester Economic Development November 2014 Overview

- Staffing Julian Long has completed multiple HUD training sessions, and we are working with Adam Cannon of Portsmouth for ongoing support as Julian undertakes work on the Five Year Plan and the annual budget. Jennifer Murphy Aubin is scheduled for maternity leave starting in December, and we will have temporary help in the office during that time. Jennifer completed the inaugural Economic Development Academy, a 10 month course with a community development project, successfully connecting the software and IT needs to three departments work flow process: Economic Development, Planning and Building Zoning, Licensing Services. Jennifer Marsh had the opportunity to directly assist with conditional use and variance approvals for businesses this month, and encouraged team members from different departments to work together, and also addressed some issues for future applications so that the City can offer an easier process once it is determined what applications are needed. Karen Pollard received her certificate for renewal of Economic Development Ethics as well as was a featured panelist for the ICMA Webinar on Economic Development: How to Develop Your Retail Recruitment Roadmap.
- Fire at 20 Spaulding Avenue Karen Pollard and Chris Wellington from DRED visited with the building owners and tenants at 20 Spaulding Avenue after the fire which took place on Nov. 26. They are very grateful to the Rochester Fire Department as well as those who provided mutual aid. The damage was kept to a minimum and all of the businesses were back up and running on Friday. The owner does not plan to replace the building that was lost, but instead plans to add more loading dock space and open paved area. Insurance should cover repairs to the roof and current loading dock area, and cleanup of smoke and water inside the building.
- **REDC Spaulding Turnpike/Route 16 Coalition** The REDC has invited NHDOT to the December 11 meeting to discuss budgets for the next biennium, and January 14 is the tentative date for the legislative discussion that will encompass all of the communities from Portsmouth to Laconia and North Conway. Foster's Rod Doherty is working on a feature story on the issue which should appear shortly.
- Business Visitation Program Jennifer Marsh has been continuing visits to local manufacturers and will be using the information to develop an internal business intelligence package, database and custom resources for these companies. Part of this plan will be scheduling follow up at least twice a year to ensure the City is aware of any problems or concerns. A second phase of this program is to visit Rochester restaurants and to do the same for them. This retention plan will allow us to track issues and expansions that will be happening in the City.
- RSA 79e Applications Two additional applications are in the pipeline, and suggested changes to the application form and the staff review form will be discussed at the December Community Development Committee meeting.
- New Hampshire Housing Market Conference Karen Pollard attended the conference on housing and is providing the data and information to Planning and Economic Development for distribution.

JOB Loan Program Update December 2014

The Job Opportunity Benefit (JOB) Loan program provides a source of funding for businesses to expand, modernize or relocate within Rochester. These funds are almost always used as "gap" financing for businesses to add additional debt to their conventional financing. Eligible applicants include Rochester businesses that commit to hiring (per HUD Regulation 24 CFR 570.209) one full-time or full-time equivalent worker per \$50,000 of CDBG funds or one full-time or full-time equivalent worker per \$35,000 of CDBG funds if calculated in the aggregate for the year across all JOB Loans.

The JOB Loan account has a balance of \$99,668 and is receiving \$5,042.17 in monthly payments.

Community and Economic Development staff are working together to identify eligible businesses that would benefit from this loan program. In addition, Community and Economic Development has reached a settlement with Carney Medical in the amount of \$5,000.

Aerospace and Defense Award Application –Year 2014

The City of Rochester led the Response and Recruitment Team for the Albany & Safran Aerospace Facility project which celebrated their grand opening in March 2014. The city persevered during a two year selection and negotiation process while managing a complex package of deliverables. Today a state-of-the-art aerospace composites facility more than 8 acres in size is creating new technology to make composite engine components for the next-generation LEAP Engine.

"Larger states can offer financial incentives that vastly overwhelm what the Granite State can offer, but New Hampshire's smallness was its strength", said Joseph Morone, Albany International President and CEO. "In Albany International's case, personally committed leaders, an innovative and willing educational system, and a unique quality of life outweighed enormous tax breaks."

Critical to the site selection process was the ability to deliver 500 employees trained in composites materials manufacturing. The development team brought together Great Bay Community College and the two aerospace manufacturers to close the gap in specific training, lab training facilities. The result is ATAC (Advanced Technology & Academic Center), open since Q1 of 2013, and now expanding so more area firms can utilize the training facility. It will deliver 500 new skilled employees to Albany and Safran over the next 5 years.

In Rochester, Albany has two manufacturing facilities, with potential to expand. They have 383 employees and anticipate hiring 162 in the next few months. Direct manufacturing employment by 2020 is estimated at 1,190 jobs. Albany invested \$24 million in equipment for the LEAP project. Safran utilizes 50 acres for the new 345,000 facility, projecting upwards of 500 employees in that plant. CAPEX will be \$38 M and \$50 M over a three year period for 2012-14.

This project represents a "new normal" in economic development, where public-private partnerships are utilized to meet long-term business needs. Vice President Joe Biden visited Rochester and pointed to what is happening between Great Bay Community College, Albany International, Safran, USA, the City of Rochester, and the State of New Hampshire is a "perfect example of how to bring manufacturing jobs back to the United States, and keep them here".

MONTHLY REPORT NOVEMBER 2014

On behalf of the Fire Department, I am pleased to provide you with the following report. It serves as a summary of the activities, projects and programs underway within the department.

DEPARTMENT INFORMATION:

During the month of November the Department responded to 327 calls for service. Of the 327 calls this month, 9 calls were for fires, ranging from a 3 alarm commercial building fire, to a first alarm apartment building fire, as well as chimney fires, a dumpster fire and two brush fires.

Crews also responded to 113 calls for vehicle accidents, and medical calls throughout the month, with 7 mutual aid calls, three of them during the Thanksgiving storm.

In addition the storm generated approximately 145 calls for multiple types of incidents including trees on houses, trees on wires, wires down, poles down and other similar incidents. Most of these calls occurred simultaneously requiring all personnel to respond throughout the length of the storm. During most of the late afternoon and evening on Wednesday November 26th absolutely every emergency vehicle was out working the incidents with one or two firefighters each, attending to calls as the fire department was inundated and could not keep up with demand, this continued well into Thanksgiving day.

While storm responses continued without stop, the Fire Department received a call for a building fire at 20 Spaulding Ave. Access to the factory was obstructed along the Milton road requiring apparatus to divert through Maine, drastically increasing our response time to an already remote location. Many mutual aid communities could not send apparatus or manpower due to their own storm related incidents; however, many Fire Departments did render assistance at the fire as it was drastically needed.

With 215 calls for service in November of 2013 this indicates a 65.8% increase in calls over the same month last year, and 61.7% increase over last month with 202 calls.

ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:

I attended the cost containment committee meeting.

Staff attended the Unitil Gas Emergency Response and Preparedness Annual Meeting which was held in Portsmouth.

I met with E-911 committee members to go over questions on addresses from the State of NH E-911.

Staff attended the Public Safety Committee meeting to discuss issues with sprinkler and fire alarm contractors.

FIRE PREVENTION:

With the most recent storm we experienced, many citizens were left in the dark and without power for several days. There were numerous calls in the area for carbon monoxide, due to generators running inside garages or close to the open garage. Please remember that generators produce carbon monoxide, and care should be taken to keep them a safe distance from your home. Carbon Monoxide is a colorless, odorless, tasteless, and invisible gas that is deadly and can kill you. Please take a minute to make sure you have a working carbon monoxide detector as well.

DUTY SHIFT:

There were 18 training sessions for fulltime firefighters. New firefighters received driver training on truck one and rescue one. All call force firefighters received training on the wire entanglement prop.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT:

City staff participated in a graded drill for the Seabrook Power Plant.

I met with Julia Chase from NH Emergency Management to discuss grants.

I attended an Emergency Shelter Training which was held at the Community Center and put on by the Red Cross.

MONTHLY REPORT November 2014

There were a total of 19,326 items circulated with 10,531 people visiting the library in the month of November. Two hundred seventy-three patrons used the library's Internet computers for 1,205 hours. Visitors to the library's web site numbered 8,865. Current number of patron registrations is 34,352. Interlibrary loan activity included 50 materials borrowed from other libraries and 249 loaned to other libraries.

Wednesday, November 5th the library was proud to present "Spirits and Hauntings" - an evening with Isabeau Esby, author of Cracking Open: Adventures of a Reluctant Medium and A.J. Kitt, author of Ghosts, Science and the Number 42. Kitt founder of the Seacoast Paranormal Research Initiative and Esby, internationally known psychic medium, discussed their books, the realities of hauntings, and what possibilities may lurk in any home, business, or graveyard.

The Chilton Automotive Manuals database is now available through the RPL website. Remote access to Cengage Learning databases is permitted to patrons of subscribing institutions who access from remote locations. Such remote access is limited to non-commercial purposes.

Please join Library Trustee Chairperson, Pam Hubbard along with library staff and patrons on a video tour of the Library. This informative video was produced by Celeste Plaia and is currently available on the RPL website.

In addition to the print versions of available books, 238 of our Library patrons downloaded 1,014 e-books to media devices through the library's web site this month. The RPL website also enabled 3 patrons access to Mango Languages.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORT FOR NOVEMBER 2014

The Planning Board reviewed and approved an extension request for Waterstone Retail, Inc. for their site plan application to construct 300,000+ square feet of commercial space off Route 11. At the same meeting the Board approved a modification request for the same applicant to increase the building area on one of the pad sites as well as a reduction in parking, changes to the landscaping, and changes to the areas for some dumpsters. The business taken up by the Planning Board typically slows in November and December and this November was no different. In addition to the applications processed by the Board, the Director of Planning gave the Board an update on the progress with Trinity Circle and they also held discussions on other roads that have not been accepted by the City. The requested that the Director prepare a summary of those streets in approved subdivisions. Both the Conservation Commission and the Historic District Commission held meetings in November and those meetings are summarized below. The Arts & Culture Commission did not meet in November.

The Planning Staff attended meetings and workshops throughout the month of November. The City received additional proposals for the Permitting and Licensing Software-Workflow Mapping. The Committee reviewed the proposals and were also given demonstrations from the companies that were chosen to do so. As always, the staff continued to provide excellent customer service to the residents and businesses of the City. If you hear otherwise, please do not hesitate to contact me.

APPLICATIONS REVIEWED BY THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Notice of Intent to Excavate: <u>13 Healthcare Drive, excavation related to construction of a new medical facility</u>: The Commission reviewed this 'intent' and had no concerns with it; they had previously reviewed the full site plan proposal of this project several months ago and expressed all concerns at that time.

Old Business: a) <u>Hope Farm</u> – The Commission voted to hire Truslow Resource Consulting, Inc. to finish this conservation easement acquisition.

b) <u>Laverdiere Farm</u> – Planning Staff updated the Commission on all the work that is still occurring at a Staff level with this project, including legal agreement, payment schedules, ownership verifications, miscellaneous inquiries, etc... Also discussed was a recent request by the new property owner to timber a large portion of the property. The Commission decided that because the conservation easement is in escrow, and thus not legally recorded yet, timbering should not be permitted at this time because doing so could jeopardize the likelihood of receiving outside funding.

Violations: Previously discussed, and new, potential land disturbance violations were discussed. The Commission concurred that contacting the City's Code Enforcement Officer might be appropriate because some of the violations are not the Conservation Commission purview.

Meet + Greet: Truslow Resource Consulting, Inc, a firm specializing in an array of natural resource matters, was awarded a City bid to help with land acquisition matters. Members of this firm met with the Conservation Commission to introduce themselves and explain the services they can provide to the Commission. The Commission explained to this firm the work that they would like see completed with regards to Hope Farm. Truslow Resource Consulting was instructed to contact the Hope Farm property owners and Planning Staff to obtain copies of everything that has been done to-date on this project. The Commission stressed that this project needs to be completed guickly.

Other: The Commission brainstormed about the need to create a PowerPoint presentation which outlines the land acquisition work they have completed in recent years.

Non Public: The Conservation held a non public session to discuss acquisition of real property.

RE: Monthly Report - November 2014

OPERATIONS: Three of the six wards met this period. Attendance has remained light. Major topic of discussion included the heroin epidemic. Also discussed were police response times, burglary prevention tips and a presentation at Ward 6 from Bridging the Gaps to recruit new volunteers. Scheduled Ward meetings in January are:

1/7/15: Ward 5 at the Community Center

1/14/15: Ward 3 at Briar Ridge Estates Club House 1/26/15: Ward 2 at the Frisbie Conference Building

1/28/15: Ward 6 at the Community Center

The TAR team had one call out for a roll-over accident on Flagg Road with serious injuries.

The Detective bureau is working on a joint operation with the Strafford County Drug Task Force to impact the heroin epidemic. There were 53 traffic stops and 5 drug arrests, as well as 2 search warrants of suspected drug houses. There were three overdose cases, no deaths resulting. There were two call outs this month, both for robberies. Det. Bourque participated in 5 ICAC (internet crimes against children) raids this period. There were 67 cases sent up from patrol for review or investigation. We logged 331 pieces of evidence, returning 31 pieces and destroying 104 pieces. There were 11 cases presented to the grand jury, all of them true bills.

COMPSTAT: We are pleased with the results we are getting with new patrol strategies. We are looking at property crime as a symptom of the real problem – drug activity. We are on pace to exceed the number of traffic stops over last year. Accidents are down year to date and DWI accidents are down significantly. All property crime categories except shoplifting and theft from motor vehicles are down.

COMMUNICATIONS: Sgt. Deluca and two of the lead Specialists attended SPOTS and TAC (terminal agency coordinator) schools. We are still trying to fill open positions in the center. We hired an additional per diem specialist that has extensive experience in Strafford County to fill open shifts as needed. The new records clerk started on November 24, 2014 and is adapting quickly.

DIVERSION PROGRAM / TEEN DRUG COURT: The second Teen Night of the year was held on with 300 teens registering.

HOUSING: Activity at housing properties was low this reporting period. Officer Blair continues to work closely with management and tenants on a daily basis to avert disputes from becoming larger issues.

K9: There were twenty calls for service by the K9 unit, 8 of those for drug searches in Rochester. There were five tracks in Rochester as well. The K9 unit will be used more frequently in our strategy to combat drugs. As staffing levels increase with officers being released from field training, we will use him more for drug interdiction and less for calls.

MV UNIT: The MV unit made 100 traffic stops with 25 summonses and 2 arrests as a result of those stops. The unit handled 17 motor vehicle accidents, issuing one summons.

POP UNIT: Officer Hayes attended several board and community meetings through the month. She attended a pre planning meeting at Skyhaven for the next Wings and Wheels event. She also attended a summit meeting on homelessness in the area. Our face book page continues to be a useful tool to interact with the public. We are up to 9304 likes and averaging 80,000 hits per month. The most wanted section continues to be successful with two of the four listed this period being apprehended.

PROSECUTION: The part time secretary had submitted and then withdrew her letter of resignation. We continue to utilize the parking enforcement officer on a temporary basis to assist with the back log in that office.

SRO: Both SRO's have had a good start to the year and reports from both schools are positive.

EXPLORERS: The explorers have been certified in CPR and acquisition of uniforms is almost complete. They participated in a weekend Explorer challenge with other posts in the area in October.

ADMINISTRATIVE: We have begun the budget season. Department staff were requested to submit suggestions for needs and wants for the budget. Those will be reviewed and vetted in the coming weeks as we build for FY16. We will be discussing CIP options regarding cruiser cameras as the majority of the equipment is over 8 years old. We have had significant issues this past year with these systems needing repair. The company sent a technician from Texas to evaluate the problems several months ago. The push is to move away from disc drives due to failures.

We continue to monitor the overtime line in both budgets and will have an updated projection in January. We will go out to bid for ballistic vests in December. The cost of these vests has increased significantly.

We recorded 156 hours of training during November, the majority for officers who attended a 40-hour block of training on interviews and interrogations. This is a highly sought after school that is useful in either patrol or detective functions. The majority of firearms instruction has been completed for the year.

Officers Hatch and Benjamin are scheduled for their FTO observation period with the goal to release them to solo patrol at the next rotation. Officer Marvin is set to graduate from the Police Academy on December 12. Officers' Williams-Hurley, Garstin and Schacht began employment on November 9. They are scheduled to attend the Academy in January. We continue to work on filling one vacancy in patrol due to the resignation of Officer Ouellette.

Dep. Chief Dumas will work with the City's Human Resources Office on interviewing candidates for the prosecution position. Once the hiring is completed two officers will go back to patrol functions.

EMD USE:

There were two Taser displays and no Taser deploys this period.

FORFEITURE FUND SPENDING:

There was \$441.12 of forfeiture spending this period.

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ROCHESTER DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS MONTHLY REPORT FOR NOVEMBER 2014

NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

The department was busy decorating downtown and preparing for the Christmas season. The downtown decorations take two full time employees 3-4 weeks to complete. They coordinate with the buildings and grounds staff for all electrical issues and in between plowing snow and treating roads, this project went well. This year we thank Paul Michaud from our highway division. Paul took the lead for this project and was assisted by David Desjardin. Paul's vision and dedication made it all come together perfectly.

HIGHWAY AND UTILITIES

The Highway Division responded to average number (41) of service calls which were either completed or scheduled for repair. Service calls for the month included sign repairs, dead animals, and traffic light issues. The crew went out to plow and treat for three winter events. Snow fence poles were put up. All sanders and wings are on trucks and the grader. Winter sand and salt hauled and is stored at the DPW. Brush trimming on Front St, Ten Rod Road and Crow Hill Road was completed. Staff continues to clean and maintain all drains and catch basins on routine schedules. Pavement markings for locating these structures with snow banks in the way are in place. Several pre-emption devices were repair on traffic light. Fleet maintenance is very busy with each event keeping equipment and trucks up and running.

The Utilities Division performed routine maintenance on the water and sewer systems, as well as responded to a total of 16 calls for service. Crews located and repaired water shut off's though out the city for non-payment and for meter replacements. Staff has been cleaning catch basins and culverts that have leaves that have fallen from the trees this fall, crews continued to blow out water gates throughout the city, and continue to do manhole inspections. The water and sewer division has also been working steadily trimming trees and thick brush cutting on the cross country water lines from the water plant on route 202A to east Rochester. Staff repaired a water main break on Quaker Lane and a service repair was completed at 22 Logan Street.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

The Buildings and Grounds crews responded to 46 requests for service in the month of November. Besides normal requests, staff put out sand barrels at 9 locations for use during icy conditions. The grounds division was able to clean up approximately 90% of the leaves from all City property. The rest will be cleaned up in the spring. We have replaced or repaired any GFI outlets that were not working on light poles that have the Christmas decor on them, checked all equipment that is used for winter operations to make sure it is in safe working condition. The tennis nets out behind the Community have been taken down and the windscreens will soon follow. TEC Electric finished the first phase of refurbishing the electrical wiring in the antique light poles through town.

WATER TREATMENT PLANT

Treated water volume for the month of November 2014 was approximately 49.2 million gallons from the surface water treatment plant. All water quality testing and monitoring was completed in accordance with NHDES requirements. Stage 2 DBP samples were collected and analyzed to be within compliance. We are pleased to report that the City of Rochester again met and

exceeded all State and Federal standards for drinking water. CDM and Metrocast are in the process of updating and repairing equipment to improve SCADA communication reliability between remote stations. Raw water quality has stabilized and we have started winter reservoir management procedures; ice over has occurred. The flow meter for the reservoir intake has been mounted and should be online within the month. Distribution sampling reflected a successful and beneficial fall hydrant flushing. Equipment and grounds maintenance was performed at the WTF, well, and tanks/stations, and inspections conducted within the watershed and structures. Lab equipment has been serviced and cleaned. Service has been scheduled for the intake vacuum prime system and the bicarbonate silo air compressor. Chemical feed lines for oxidized caustic and chlorine were replaced. Preparations continue for the filter upgrade project, including some internal reworking of feed and control lines.

Staff attended an emergency response tabletop exercise involving potential surface- and groundwater contamination, as well as training to prepare for the January 2015 implementation of the Revised Total Coliform Rule. Budget and CIP preparation is underway.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY

Items that were completed during the month November: We continue to work with the coalition of communities on related wastewater and Great Bay Estuary issues. We completed replacement and programming of VFD for RAS pump #3. Our crew did an outstanding job with snow removal and maintaining emergency standby power at the pump stations during the Thanksgiving Day storm. We participated in two webinars, one for concerns on Ebola in wastewater and the other in helping to prepare for winter energy pricing. Our staff attended State sponsored training classes. We also attended the New Rt 125 pump station construction meeting. We have been gathering data for preparation of O&M budget. CIP requests have been submitted. Semi-Annual groundwater sampling and testing has been completed as well as annual field instrumentation calibration. The SCADA computer upgrade is now complete. Service to flow meters in the main interceptors completed. Our plant has switched alum sludge lagoons to allow for freeze/thaw process to occur. Staff performed preventative and corrective maintenance on equipment, machinery and instrumentation. Average effluent flow for the month, 2.425 Million Gallons per Day (MGD). Percent of design flow = 48.2%. Percent of design flow for 2014 = 64.0%. Precipitation = 2.90"

CIP:

- Catherine-Sheridan-Knight Road and Utility Reconstruction: Work started early August and is expected to continue through 6/16.
- Stillwater Circle Bridge Repairs: Work started in early August and anticipate completion before year's end or shortly thereafter.
- Chesley Hill Road Reconstruction: Design underway with construction in 2015.
- Strafford Square Roundabout: Federal funding not available until Federal Fiscal Year 2016 (Oct 2015). Intend to use calendar year 2015 to effectuate utility relocations and 2016 for actual construction. DPW met with DES Cultural Resources Department regarding 2-4 Walnut St.
- Wakefield Street Reconstruction: Design underway. Construction funding will be sought in FY16.

- EDA Crossroads Water and Sewer: DPW has been given authorization to proceed with design. Kickoff meeting held with engineers.
- FY15 Paving: Complete. No holdovers into the Spring. Public Works Committee was given a draft FY16 Roadwork Plan to review.
- Salmon Falls Rd. HSIP Curve Softening project: Working with residents to resolve temporary and permanent construction easements. Plan is to construct in 2015.
- Sidewalks: Work to resume in Spring.
- Milton Road Corridor Analysis: Analysis started in August. Anticipate completion this year.
- Granite Ridge Public Outlay: DPW met with developer and engineers to determine the design approach to provide domestic and fire fighting water supplies to the development. Design remains on track.
- Franklin St.-Western Ave.-Adams Ave. Road and Utility Reconstruction: Design underway. Construction to start in summer 2015. Western Ave./First St. Pump Station Replacement has been rolled into this project.
- Rt. 125 Pump Station: On-site work anticipated to start in spring.
- Surface Treatment Water Plant Upgrades: Work to be completed in summer 2015.
- City Hall Annex: Architect presented findings including review of Community Center option to City Council. DPW awaiting further direction from Governing Body.
- Colonial Pines Sewer / Wastewater Interceptor Upgrades: Design underway 2014
 2015. Construction funds to be sought in FY16 budget.
- Trinity Circle: roadway work complete with as builts still pending and sewer pump station maintenance is underway.
- Howard Brook Culverts Replacement: Anticipate construction in spring 2015.
- DPW Facility Study: DPW met with engineers to better refine the building(s)/site concept.
- Round Pond Expansion: DPW met with State DES regarding environmental impact of raising level of the pond.

- DPW met with Fairgrounds Committee in attempt to re-negotiate the snow disposal fee structure.
- DPW was advised that the NH MS4 Stormwater permit looks to be issued mid-2015 with compliance by 1/1/16.
- DPW met with contracted mechanical service, Honeywell to review costs associated with a possible follow-on contract since current five year contract expires in 2015.
- City Council approved new Grade 11 Assistant City Engineer.

Rochester Arena Highlights

With hockey and ice skating season in full swing, major projects at the Rochester Arena are at a lull. Preparation for going forward is still very active, as plans are currently being developed with a structural engineer to produce drawings regarding the arena roof structure for options and solutions for CIP in FY16. Below is a brief review of Rochester Arena Improvement highlights completed to date.

- Conducted a complete facility analysis and review by an outside agency.
- Removed and replaced 200 linear feet of failed CMU (cement block) wall.

- Demolished and removed two story wooden structure that housed offices, meeting room, pro-shop and warm room to clear space for new bleacher stands
- Relocated skate rental room and attendant's office using space formerly occupied by YMCA
- Dismantled old bleachers and removed from facility and recycled material
- Painted all exposed structural steel to match color scheme and to prevent further degradation of the steel
- Replaced old bleacher stand (approx 90 ft long) with a new Hussey system that is 132 ft long with built in above seat heating for customer comfort
- Demolished and completely redesigned both public restrooms to make them customer friendly and to meet ADA codes and other applicable regulations.
- Insulated 180 feet of wall on the west side of the arena interior.
- Increased the upstairs (formerly YMCA) programming studio space by approximately 20%.
- Corrected two separate structural issues discovered during the restroom demolition.

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RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING CITY MANAGER TO PROVIDE LETTER OF SUPPORT ON BEHALF OF CITY OF ROCHESTER, WITH RESPECT TO A PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO A CONSERVATION EASEMENT, OF WHICH THE CITY IS AN EXECUTORY INTEREST HOLDER, SITUATE ON THE WESTERLY SIDE OF NH ROUTE 11, IN THE CITY OF ROCHESTER, AND TO TAKE ADDITIONAL ACTIONS WITH REPECT TO THE SAME

BE IT RESOLVED BY MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

WHEREAS, the City of Rochester (the "City") is the Executory Interest Holder under a Conservation Easement Deed granted by Route 11 Investments, Inc., dated May 6, 2010, recorded at Book 3832, Page 179 of the Strafford County Registry of Deeds, such easement covering approximately 46.2 acres of land situate off of the westerly sideline of NH Route 11, in Rochester, NH (the "Easement"); and

WHEREAS, the owner of the larger tract on which the Easement is located (the "Property"), at the time of the Easement's creation, was Route 11 Investments, Inc., however the ownership of the portion of the Property on which the Easement is located has recently been transferred to Waterstone Rochester, LLC (the "Property Owner"); and

WHEREAS, the Property Owner and the City have entered into an agreement providing for the development, by the Property Owner, of a portion of the Property, located almost entirely outside of the Easement area, including certain infrastructure improvements designed to be ultimately transferred to the City, including specifically a so-called "Frontage Road" running parallel to, and westerly of, NH Route 11 designed to promote better traffic flow and to improve safety on NH Route 11; and

WHEREAS, the safest and most efficient design of the said Frontage Road requires that such Frontage Road encroach upon 121 sq. ft. of the currently existing 46.2 Easement area; and

WHEREAS, the Property Owner, in order to utilize the safest and most efficient design of the said Frontage Road, proposes to amend the Easement by withdrawing therefrom the aforesaid 121 sq. ft. of the currently existing 46.2 Easement area which would be impacted by the creation/construction of the aforesaid Frontage Road as currently designed, and, by way of compensating for such withdrawal, expanding the Easement area by making an additional 2,000 sq. ft. of the Property, not currently located within Easement area, subject to the terms of such Easement by virtue of an amendment to the current Easement that would both withdraw therefrom the 121 sq. ft. area associated with the Frontage Road that would encroach upon the Easement, and would subject to the terms of the Easement an additional 2,000 sq. ft. of the Property not

currently located within Easement area (the amended Conservation Easement being hereinafter referred to as the "Amended Easement"); and

WHEREAS, a copy of a plan depicting the areas being withdrawn from and added to the Amended Easement have been provided to the Mayor and City Council, and explained to them by representatives of the Property Owner and the City's administration:

NOW THEREFORE, the Rochester Mayor and City Council, by adoption of this resolution, hereby authorize the City Manager of the City of Rochester, or his designee, to sign a letter of support on behalf of the Rochester Mayor and City Council and City administration, to the NH Department of Environmental Services and the NH Attorney General's Office, as well as any and all other regulatory bodies and/or officials having jurisdiction over, and/or with respect to, the proposed amendment to the Easement that would result in the Amended Easement, or an amended Easement in a form deemed by the City Manager, in his sole judgment, to be in the best interests of the City of Rochester. Further the City Manager of the City of Rochester, or his designee, be, and hereby is, authorized to sign, on behalf of the City of Rochester, any and all deeds, and/or other documents, necessary implement and effectuate an amendment to the Easement so as to result in the Amended Easement or an amended Easement in a form deemed by the City Manager, in his sole judgment, to be in the best interests of the City of Rochester.

SUMMARY STATEMENT

Technical plans and specifications for the "Frontage Road" in the Granite Ridge Development District are proceeding very well, and it has been identified that a minor modification of the Conservation Easement accepted by the City of Rochester during the preliminary excavation would be beneficial to both development and conservation.

Maps and documents attached to this Agenda Bill identify a very small triangular area impacting the city's frontage road (121 square feet/approx 10'x21'). Waterstone Retail has offered to expand the existing easement by 2,000 square feet along the southern side, which would expand the buffer between the retail development and the transmission lines owned by Public Service of New Hampshire.

The Department of Public Works and our engineers have endorsed this offer in the interest the city's infrastructure and proper road design. In a joint meeting on December 18, 2014, the go-forward process was outlined.

The Conservation Commission reviewed the development plans at their meetings in February and March, an excerpt of the March minutes regarding this project is attached. Waterstone withdrew an encroachment for parking in the subject area where they are currently offering an expansion of the easement by 2,000 square feet. All other conditions as approved by the Rochester Planning Board will be complied with. Consultation with Seth Creighton, Chief Planner and staff to the Conservation Commission indicates that they will review the comments from NH DES.


A new regulation in New Hampshire is a requirement for the Attorney General's office to review the criteria on any modification of conservation easements, and the AG's office as well as NH DES, are aware of the proposal. The City of Rochester is the easement holder and the City Council accepted the original easement. To provide support to the application at the AG's office as well at NH DES, it would be beneficial to include a letter of support from the City of Rochester about the easement modification.


RECOMMENDED ACTION

Remove 121 s.f. of land area from the conservation easement located on the property in exchange for 2,000 s.f. of area to be added to the conservation easement, as shown on attached the plans entitled, "Overall Conservation Easement Modification Plan" sheet 1 of 2 and "Conservation Easement Modification Plan" sheet 2 of 2, prepared by Tighe & Bond and dated October 24, 2014.

The Board of Directors request that The City of Rochester act as the Fiscal Agent for Bridging the Gaps (BTG) to enable (BTG) to continue to receive funds from the five year federal grant. Our previous Fiscal Agent has asked to terminate the relationship with BTG. Without a fiscal Agent BTG will no longer be eligible for continued grant funding.

Bridging the Gaps (BTG) is the Rochester Community Coalition for Alcohol and Drug Prevention.

The primary focus is on youth.

Background:

The Federal Grant is from the Drug Free Communities (DFC) Support Program which is part of SAMHSA (Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration) under the Federal Department of Health and Human Services.

The Coalition Coordinator has operated out of an office provided by the Rochester Police Department for the last several years.

Section A: Project Narrative

1. What is the coalition's developmental history?

Bridging the Gaps: The Rochester Community Coalition for Alcohol and Drug Prevention, began in December 2005, by a committed group of volunteers who came together to address substance abuse issues among youth in the Rochester community. At that time, the Juvenile Diversion Coordinator was seeing a rise in offenses related to alcohol and drugs in the community. After speaking with other law enforcement in the city and staff from the local school, it was clear that they were also noticing the same trend in alcohol and drug use among the Rochester youth. During its inaugural meeting, over 20 people attended because they wanted to make change for a healthier community and safer choices of youth. Participation came from local medical professionals, city government officials, mental health counselors, parents, probation officers, community leaders and business owners as well as law enforcement and school officials. The first 3 years of the coalition's existence were carried out by an all-volunteer initiative, with members meeting during and after business hours to address gaps in alcohol, tobacco and other drug treatment, prevention and intervention services in the community. Since its inception, the Coalitions vision has always been to promote a healthier Rochester by addressing youth substance use.

The initial years of the Coalition were spent in defining the vision, reaching out to the community to provide education and information and assessing the community culture in terms of substance issues. Coalition leadership also worked with interested youth at the high school to develop a core group who would implement peer to peer education and awareness around the issue. In 2007, the leadership also developed a long-term strategic plan for the coalition utilizing the SWOT method (strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats.)

In 2008, Bridging the Gaps applied for and was awarded a Drug Free Community (DFC) Grant. Through the DFC funding as well as other funding from local groups, Bridging the Gaps has become a vehicle for change within the community. DFC Funding allowed the Coalition to hire a full time coordinator to provide support to coalition members in continuing the grass roots efforts they had begun in prevention, education and early intervention. Through coordinating monthly meetings, community forums and community events the Coalition was able to gain added support from many local partners.

In 2009, the coalition embarked on a year-long process to implement the Strategic Prevention Framework model into its structure, strategic planning and overall decision making process for creating change. Through a series of community forums, focus groups, community readiness interviews and analysis of local data the coalition conducted a thorough assessment of the problems facing the community around youth substance use and what specifically was happening in Rochester to contribute to youth use. The assessment also identified gaps in the coalition membership which led to capacity building and bringing key stakeholders to the table such as Rochester Main Street and the Recreation Department. Following the year-long process the coalition had created a detailed plan which utilized the Seven Strategies for Community Change and begin implementing environmental based initiatives to change the culture of Rochester around youth and substance use.

As a result of the assessment phase, one gap was instantly apparent. While members of the high school staff served on the coalition, the Coalition did not have the full support of the school district or the support of staff from the middle school. Through ongoing dialogue the school, it's partnership with the Coalition has strengthened over the years and helped to create multiple programs at both the middle school and high school levels to address youth substance abuse. These programs include the Youth Empowerment Teams (Youth to Youth), the school Data Team, Universal Programming (i.e. Red Ribbon Week, Project Graduation, Prom Safety Awareness, etc.) in addition to implementing the Project Success program (an evidence based program on the National Registry for Evidence Based Programs and Practices) for grades 6 through 12. Additionally, the school district works closely with the coalition in providing resources and information to parents around youth substance use. The school's partnership is important to the coalition as they are a direct access to the youth of the community and they see the problems of substance abuse first hand. The Coalition is now the first place the school district goes to when they need help addressing a new or trending issue with alcohol, tobacco or other drugs in the school and the community.

In addition to the increased partnership with the schools the Coalition has seen increased participation from the Police Department and the Recreation Department. These two city departments, along with the school district, helped to create one of our most successful programs for the youth of the Rochester and surrounding communities, Teen Night. Monthly Teen Nights are designed to directly impact increasing the protective factors of "community attachment" and "opportunities for pro-social community involvement."

The Coalition's progression in its first five years has shown tremendous growth in what was a small grass roots effort. They now have the support of various city departments, the schools, local businesses, churches, the local Rotary Club, Rochester Main Street, the Chamber of Commerce, parents and youth of the community. The Coalition will sustain its presence in the community through initiatives and strategies it already works on and will continue to grow and evolve as long as needed to address youth substance abuse.

Today, Bridging the Gaps continues to bring together community members to bridge the gaps in prevention and early intervention of youth substance use. The Coalition focuses on alcohol, marijuana, prescription and over the counter drug use as well as tobacco use by youth through programming and raising awareness of the realities of substance use. Those involved in the Coalition also want to do more to change the alcohol and drug culture of Rochester for the betterment its youth and our future.

Bridging the Gaps is no longer a group of volunteers who meet once in a while in the community to put on one or two events a year. They have grown into a collaboration of committed members and representatives from all twelve sectors of the community and beyond. The Coalition holds monthly membership and board meetings to oversee and drive the work in the Rochester community.

The Coalition has three levels to its structure, Board members, coalition members and resource members. The Board of Directors consists of the Executive Board (four officers: President, Vice Chair, Treasurer and Secretary) and at least five additional representatives from the Coalition membership. The Executive Board is voted upon by the Board of Directors at large. Coalition

Membership includes the Board of Directors and representatives from the twelve sectors of the community with more than one from each sector preferred. Each Coalition Member serves on a committee to help with the work of the coalition. The committees are chaired by Board of Director members.

The Coalition has five committees in which the membership participates. Each of the committees was created to help with the work of coalition in the action plan as well as to embody the Strategic Prevention Framework. Members can be part of multiple committees if they choose. The five committees are: Strategic Planning and Sustainability, Public and Community Relations/Awareness, Substance Free Programming and Events, Membership and Capacity Building, and Assessment and Evaluation.

In addition to the Board of Directors and Coalition Membership, Bridging the Gaps has Resource Members: community members who are unable to make the time commitment but are willing to volunteer and help with coalition work, offer resources such as in-kind material support, trainings, or connections within the community. Bridging the Gaps also has partners from around the community. These partners while not official members of the coalition stay connected to its work through the distribution list to know what is currently going on in the coalition.

Additionally, Bridging the Gaps has two Youth Empowerment Teams (Youth to Youth) comprised of students from the Middle School and High School. Youth to Youth members are engaged in creating change in the Rochester community, promoting public awareness for peers on alcohol, tobacco and other drugs, creating substance free alternatives for Rochester youth and have representation in the coalition membership.

Bridging the Gaps has worked closely with the Rochester School Department and the Rochester Police Department to provide ongoing education and awareness through the school resource officer at the middle school level. The Coalition also worked with the School Department to hire a Certified Prevention Specialist to implement the evidence based program Project Success. Bridging the Gaps has implemented Project Success at Rochester Middle School, Spaulding High School and Bud Carlson Academy (The School Districts Alternative High School). The Project Success Counselor is responsible for Universal Programming within the schools such as coordinating Red Ribbon Week, Children of Substance Abusing Parents supports, Alcohol Awareness Month, Kick Butts activities, a Mock Crash, and oversees the Youth Empowerment Teams.

The Youth Empowerment Teams, Youth to Youth, have worked hard to create public awareness of alcohol and drug issues that youth face. Youth to Youth is modeled after the Dover, NH Youth to Youth program, which is currently in the process of becoming an evidence based program. In Rochester, we have teams in the Middle School and High School. Members of Youth to Youth create public service announcements, preform educational skits for elementary school students, help in planning and implementing universal programs in the school and are positive peer role models for other students in the school.

Rochester Matters, a community wide media campaign, which was created through a comprehensive assessment of the risk factors and protective factors of the community, focuses

on positive social norms for youth, parents and community members. Over the last year the campaign has been rolling out into the Rochester community Posters and other promotional items with Rochester Matters messaging on them were released in October 2012, December 2012, and February 2013. The last round of messaging is set to be released in May 2013.

One of the most important messages that the Rochester Matters campaign is getting out to the community is to care about the community you live in. Through the Youth Risk Behavior Survey it was determined that only 50% of the students surveyed felt like they mattered in the community. In creating the campaign, the overarching message established was \I Choose to Care About: Rochester" as a way to promote that it takes everyone; youth, parents and the community to make a difference for Rochester. Ads were placed at the Rochester Ice Arena which has thousands of visitors each season. In addition, fun give-away items like sunglasses were created to get the message out in the community. Over all, the messaging has been well received throughout the community.

All the messaging in the Rochester Matters campaign came from the data of the 2011 Youth Risk Behavior Survey and the 2012 Rochester Community Survey. The coalition looked at data relating to past 30 day alcohol use, peer disapproval, parental disapproval when determining what the messaging would be. One of the posters targeted at youth states that 7 out of 10 Rochester youth have not consumed alcohol in the past 30 days. The message is to show youth that they are in the majority when they choose not to drink. A poster targeted at parent's states that 8 out of 10 Rochester youth say that parents are their primary influence on whether to drink. The message goes on to say that it is important for parents to talk to their kids about alcohol because they are listening. Another poster targeted at youth focuses on peer pressure encouraging youth to not pressure their friends into trying alcohol because 2 out of 3 youth first try alcohol because of peer pressure. In all the messages a continued theme of "I Choose to Care" is present because we all choose to care about something.

One of the greatest accomplishments of the Coalition is the Rochester Teen Nights. True collaboration efforts within the community, Teen Nights are a substance free event that is put on by The Rochester Recreation Department, Rochester Police Department, Bridging the Gaps, area businesses and non-profits. Over the three years since they began, the Teen Nights have grown in attendance from an average of 68 youth per month to an astounding 315 youth per month.

Teen Nights began in response to a city council member stating there was nothing for teens to do in the community. Seeing a great potential for youth in the community to have a night where they can hang out in a safe and substance free environment, be given a free meal, and have access to various resources from different non-profit organizations, drew the Rochester Police Department, Rochester Recreation Department and Bridging the Gaps together. Businesses offer donations to purchase food for the youth each month. This meal may be the only meal some of the youth get all weekend. Area non-profits come in with volunteers to hand out information on their services ranging from alcohol and drug support to sexual health topics. They also are asked to come up with an activity for the youth to participate in.

Teen Nights have grown into a solid protective factor in the community, giving youth a sense of connection with adult role models and service organizations. The youth of Rochester view Teen

Nights as an opportunity to come together in a safe drug free environment; they have an attachment to this community event and it is something to which they look forward. Many of the youth know about Teen Nights from older siblings and long for the time when they are old enough to participate. Teen Nights are utilized to maximize prevention efforts across multiple risk factors in the community. Having positive, caring, adult, role models from all the participating agencies, departments and groups has created a better sense of community among the youth. Teen Nights show the youth of Rochester that they do matter in the community

WHEREAS, that subsequent to the adoption of the aforesaid Resolution the records of the City of Rochester Assessor have contained a copy of an unexecuted deed of the aforementioned Property from the City of Rochester to one "Peter Nichols of Danforth Street in the City of Portland, County of Cumberland and State of Maine", which deed was prepared for signature by the then Mayor of the City of Rochester, John Shaw; and


WHEREAS, apparently from a time shortly subsequent to the passage of the aforementioned Resolution and the preparation of the unsigned draft of deed of the Property to "Peter Nichols", the assessor's records for the City of Rochester with respect to the Property has listed the name of the aforesaid "Peter Nichols", as owner of such Property, and the taxes on such Property have since that date, and until the present date, appear to have been paid on said Property by the said "Peter Nichols"; and

WHEREAS, despite the foregoing circumstances, the records at the Strafford County Registry of Deeds fail to contain an executed and/or recorded deed from the City of Rochester to the said "Peter Nichols" in the form of the unsigned deed referred to above and contained in the records of the City of Rochester Assessor; and

WHEREAS, on information and belief, as represented to the City by the aforementioned Peter Nichols and/or his representatives, the signed original of the above-mentioned deed from the City to the said Nichols has apparently been inadvertently destroyed, mislaid and/or lost; and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid "Peter Nichols", has sometimes, and more formerly, also been known by the name "Michael S. Nicholos", and wishes to have the current Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester ratify and affirm the actions of the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester taken on January 22, 1974, and to implement the purpose and intent of the same by conveying to the said Michael S. Nicholos a/k/a Peter Nichols, the aforementioned Property by duly signed and property executed deed of the City of Rochester;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester, by adoption of this Resolution, hereby ratify and confirm the actions of the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester, as reflected in the adoption of the above referenced January 22, 1974 Resolution with regard to the Property, and further, authorize the City Manager to execute a deed to the said Michael S. Nicholos a/k/a Peter Nichols, of the aforesaid Railroad Round House property, such deed to be upon such terms and conditions as to its contents as the City Manager of the City of Rochester deems to be in the best interests of the City of Rochester, and further authorizes the said City Manager to execute and sign, on behalf of the City of Rochester, such additional documents as may be necessary to implement effectuate the purpose and intent of this Resolution, as well as the purpose and intent of the above referenced Resolution of January 22, 1974, with respect to said Railroad Round House property.

I represent Peter Nichols who purchased property on Columbus Avenue from the City of Rochester in 1974. Unfortunately I could not find a recorded deed from the City to Mr. Nichols.

I know Mr. Nichols has been paying the real estate taxes on this property since 1974 so I began my research at the Tax Assessor's Office. I have enclosed herewith a copy of the Tax Card regarding the property. The Assessor's Office had a file which also contained a copy of the relevant section of the minutes of the Council meeting on January 22, 1974 at which the City voted to sell the parcel known as the "Railroad Round House" property (I remember that round house from my grammar school days at St. Mary's on Charles Street!) which property was located on Columbus Avenue, Upham and Knight Streets for the sum of \$50,000.00. I have enclosed a complete copy of the minutes for that meeting which I obtained from the City Clerk.

The Tax Assessor's Office's file also contained an unsigned Warranty Deed from the City of Rochester to Peter Nichols. The Deed was prepared for John Shaw's signature and for an acknowledgment by Paul B. Urion. A copy is enclosed.

I have asked my client to review any records which he may have concerning this transaction and he advised that the he could not find a deed. After nearly forty years no one really remembers whether there was a signed, unrecorded deed or simply the unsigned deed.

I would like to obtain a deed from the City of Rochester Peter Nichols to establish recorded title in his name.

RESOLUTION TO FURCHASE PROPERTY FOR FIRE STATION

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council:

That the sum of \$60,000.00 be and is hereby appropriated for the purchase of the so-called Robie Property. Said property located on the easterly side of Wakefield Street adjoining and abutting the property of the Rochester City Hall and running to Summer Street and numbered 37, 41 and 41-A Wakefield Street, Nochester,

THAT the said property shall be acquired for the use of a new central fire station or any other use deemed prudent by the Hayor and City Council of the City of Rochester.

Said sum of 360,000.00 shall be raised by the Finance Committee in a manner that it deems is in the best Interest of the City of Rochester and in accordance with the New Hampshire Municipal Finance Act.

Councilman Reed: May I ask for a report from the Fire Committee on this property? Mayor Shaw: We have had reports from them several times.

Councilman Desmarais: I talked with the Chief and he said that certainly is the spot for a Fire Station.

Councilman Desmarais moved that it be adopted, seconded by Councilman Kondall on roll call, nine Councilmen present voted Yes.

Mayor Shaw: I have a petition for Cable TV. I would like to have the Finance Committee and Purchasing Committee bring back the report at the next meeting, so ordered.

Mayor Shaw: I have had a request for a street light on Corey brive off Groy Road. Referred to Street Light Committee, so ordered.

Mayor Shaw: I have a petition from David C. Fisher and Joseph and Anna Frazekas for rezoning the Eastern side of Wakefield Street. Referred to the Planning Board to be brought up at the next meeting. So ordered.

Mayor Shaw: The Fire Department needs a new truck. The Chief said that it would be expensive to fix up the one that blew up last week. I have found a place in Manchester who will do it and the price will be in the vicinity of less than ten Thousand Dollars.

Whereas the ladder truck of the Sochester Fire Department is in need of a new diesel engine and other repairs that the Fire Committee of the City Council be authorized to purchase the needed engine and supervise the needed repairs, and

Therefor that a sum of money not to exceed \$10,000.00 (Ten Thousand Dollars) be and is hereby appropriated, said sum to be raised by the Finance Committee in manner that it deems is in the best interest of the City, and in accordance with the New Hampshire Municipal Finance Act.
