#### SUMMARY STATEMENT

The attached letter from Metrocast dated November 19, 2015 indicates that Metrocast has decided to cease their local origination programming and studio operations effective March 1, 2016. Channel 12 will become a Community Bulletin Board used only to post Public Service Announcements.

The following is excerpted from the Franchise Agreement, page 23, Section 3.8 (j) : At the option of the City Council ... Franchisee (Metrocast) shall provide the third Access Channel pursuant to Section 3.8(d) for public access programming which shall be produced, cablecast and managed by the City or its designee. <u>The City shall provide Franchisee with ninety (90) days written notice of its intention to exercise this option.</u> If the City Council exercises this option, all obligations pertaining to Access Programming in this Franchise Agreement under Applicable Law shall apply to the third Access Channel within ninety (90) days of the City Council notice to Franchisee. (The Franchise Agreement can be found here: <u>FRANCHISE AGREEMENT</u>).

#### **RECOMMENDED ACTION**

Authorize the City Manager to inform Metrocast of the City's intention to exercise its' option of a third Public Access Channel.

Dear Mayor Jean:

As you know, viewers today have many different options to view, create and share programming of interest to local communities, including YouTube, social media sites, and other online venues. At the same time, interest in platforms such as Local Origination (LO) has significantly decreased.

These developments, coupled with recent staffing changes, have prompted us to evaluate the existing Local Origination model. After careful consideration, we have decided to cease our local origination programming and studio operations effective March 1, 2016.

MetroCast will now use Channel 12 as a Community Bulletin Board channel, which will be used to post Public Service Announcements (PSAs) from local non-profit agencies and groups, as well as information for MetroCast customers.

We have updated our website (<u>https://www.metrocast.com/channel12</u>) with information on how you and members of the communities we serve in New Hampshire and Maine may submit content for the Community Bulletin Board channel.

#### Metrocast and PEG Overview for Council

Background:

#### What is PEG? (Public, Educational, Government) television?

When a community negotiates a franchise agreement with their local cable provider, one of the things that the community can seek is space for local public, education and government cable channels as well as collecting franchise fees on behalf of the City to operate these PEG Channels. The cable company provides these services for use of the right-of-way (ROW) that the cable company uses when it installs the cable lines throughout the community.

#### In Rochester, our Government & Educational channels are: Ch.26 – Government, Ch.25 – Educational (Schools).

#### Metrocast has control of Ch.12, and it was known as "Local Origination".

While Metrocast produced community programming on channel 12 as well as maintaining a bulletin board for non-profits, their model was different than Public Access in that they allowed and produced commercial programming. *Per Federal Communication Commission regulations, (and our franchise agreement) traditional PEG stations are not allowed to be commercial in nature.* 

*Metro cast* Channel 12 is also a regional channel, that services Rochester, Farmington, Milton, Barrington, Strafford, and Sanford ME areas.

#### Some of types of programs that had been produced by and running on Metrocast Ch.12:

-Local Church services (3 -5), (taped by the churches and then handed off to Metrocast for broadcast) -Events hosted by the Greater Rochester Chamber of Commerce: Chamber Annual Meeting, Annual Awards Banquet, State of the City, Candidates forums, Holiday Parade, Tree lighting, "Economic Forecast" Chamber spotlight

-Main Street Show - Sidewalk Talk

-High school athletics - @5 events per team per year, including some tournaments

-Face Off - political commentary show (?)

-Community Concerns - re. issues and non-profits

-Veterans Forum show

-NH Issues and Answers

-Health Series / Recovery show

-Large School events - Spaulding Holiday show, concerts, graduation

#### **Two Typical models of management of a Public Access station-** (*no station operates exactly the same*)

1) town or city department, just as the Government or Educational Channels are

2) some of the larger stations have become a 5013C (and may include the P, E and G)

Some operational points:

- Can be largely funded by Franchise Fees, either directly or from the general budget

- 501C3 can do additional fundraising

- Typically board oversees policies but not day to day operations

- Underwriting is allowed for individual producers, as well as the station (guidelines from the FCC to distinguish from a commercial - similar to Public Television)

- Some charge small fees for training of equipment, video production, and other media

- Staffed by 1 to 2 or 3 people plus part time (depending if your Public Access station overlaps w Government, etc.),

- Some have all 3 PEG stations under a central management, some are Public and Government with Educational being managed under the School Department,

- Programs produced by citizens and volunteers

**CONTENT** - \* biggest difference between Public - G & E, is that Public Access **Content** - is protected by First Amendment Rights - Free Speech, the managers or municipality do not exercise control of content.

#### Some examples of what is regulated (per FCC regulations) (not allowed)

copyright infringement privacy infringement commercial speech obscenity\*

**Management of content** - Many models of Best Practices exist. Stations have in place: guidelines, by laws, compliance sign offs for producers, adult advisory warnings, disclaimers, etc.

#### Types of common programming

Bulletin board messaging - for community events, non-profits/social services, fundraising events, church suppers, arts and culture events.

Video programs - community interest programming - anything about the community, - cultural events, recreation opportunities, public forums on housing, health and other issues, Veterans affairs, fitness, cooking, church services, senior citizen interests, school sports, club sports, etc etc.

#### Who does the programming - no two stations are exactly the same -

Some programming is done by paid staff managers of the station - tend to be community interest shows, like the holiday parades, or large school sports events, or municipal programing

Paid staff manage, supervise and run the equipment for studio shows, with citizen producers hosting or putting show together

Some stations have a large volunteer pool, with ongoing classes for the public

#### With a continuing strong cable audience, the modern cable stations are thought of as "community

## media centers". They do a lot of community outreach, partner with other entities, and utilize social media and have an on line video presence, with YouTube or Vimeo channels. Other partnerships

Bedford and Manchester (perhaps more) are forming or partnering with low powered local radio stations

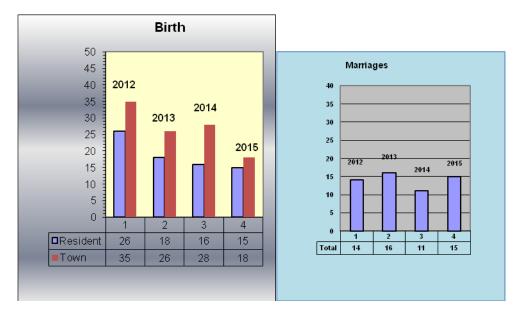

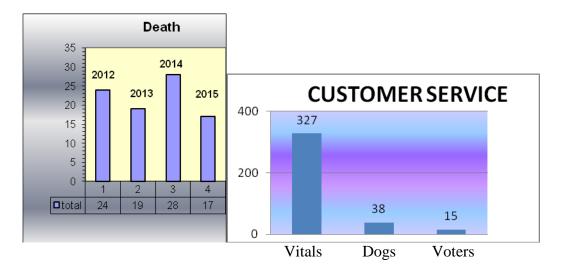
#### **Vital Statistics**

#### CODE VIOLATION TYPE & OCCURRENCES Month of: December 2015

#### **Code Compliance Deficiencies**

There are up to four steps of actions being used to deal with complaints/ violations: The first being verbal contact. The next method is a written notice of violation. This consists of a notice that is mailed first class as well as certified mail giving the property owner or violator a detailed description of the deficiencies and a date to make the appropriate corrections. The requested date depends on the time that is considered reasonable for the requested action that needs corrected, for instance, a minor repair to a fence may warrant a couple of days, while replacing an entire fence may require a few weeks. If there has been no contact made by the recipient of the notice, a follow up inspection is then made. If the violation(s) still exist, a second notice of violation is mailed with a new correction date on it. This process is then followed through again with a final notice. If the violation has still not been corrected after these notices, the paper work will be forwarded to the City Attorney for legal/court action to be taken. If the violation was a time sensitive issue, such as trash piling up, we would skip the second notice and go straight to a final notice to help expedite the process.

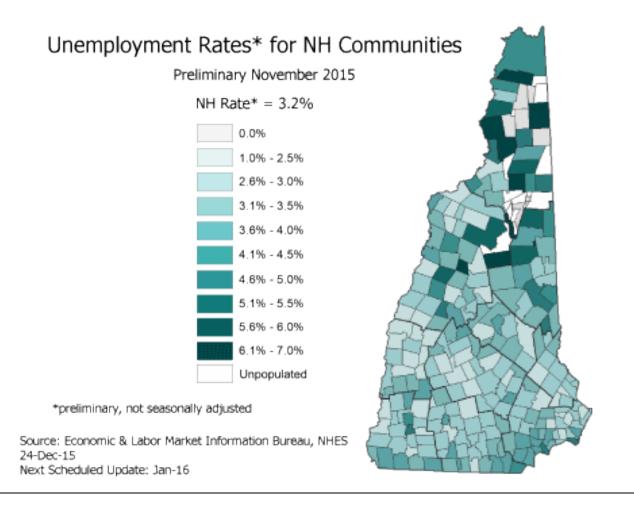

#### **Economic Indicators to Watch**

With the great expansion and investments from the City and the advanced manufacturing sector in the community, there is a growing need to provide affordable housing in order to support the ongoing needs of the workforce.

While our unemployment rates are dropping and are considered low in relation to other communities within New Hampshire, the trend of losing workforce numbers is an economic health indicator to closely monitor. In order to encourage the continued growth of our industrial sectors, part of attracting a trained workforce is to ensure that there are quality affordable places to live.





#### Indicator #1 – Labor Force

Local unemployment reported by NH Employment Security shows a significant reduction of 1.6%, down to 3.0%. The troubling statistic is the stagnation of the Rochester labor force, reducing by 10 participants since Nov 2013. Labor force and workforce participation needs to grow in order to meet the needs of area businesses and service providers.

The lack of new housing construction over the past two years may play a role in the lack of workforce growth. The Planning Board has had applications to consider under the new zoning regulations, but approvals and construction lag behind.

Some of these positions may go unfilled without skilled workforce or available housing.

## ROCHESTER ENCOURAGES DEVELOPMENT IN SIX APPROVED ECONOMIC REVITILIZATION ZONES (ERZs)

ROCHESTER, NH – New Hampshire does not have a lot of incentives, and is better known for the taxes it DOESN'T have – NO SALES TAX, NO INCOME TAX, and NO PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX. Economic Revitalization Zones (ERZs) are approved by the Commissioner of Resources an Economic Development in communities that apply to the program for locations where they want to encourage private investment. Rochester has successfully applied six times to the ERZ program for the following zones:

- 1. Cocheco Revitalization Zone
- 2. Downtown Rochester Zone
- 3. Gonic Revitalization Zone
- 4. Granite Ridge Development District Zone
- 5. Granite State Business Park Zone
- 6. Milton Road Revitalization Zone

Firms with new investment or expansion projects within an ERZ may qualify for New Hampshire tax credits against the state Business Enterprise Tax and the state Business Profits Tax, with certain requirements and limitations. Qualified investments include: building, expanding, altering or repairing facilities, purchasing machinery and equipment or materials, other than inventory. Firms within the zones making these qualified investments and generating full-time employment are eligible for these tax credits. The amount of the tax credit varies according to the amount of the wages paid.



There are approximately 186 ERZs in 63 cities and towns in New Hampshire. It provides a benefit to attract and retain businesses within an ERZ and has proven successful over the years. Karen Pollard, Economic Development Manager said, "We are pleased to have six Economic Revitalization Zones available to attract business and investment to Rochester. These tax credits are a valuable incentive supporting business expansion in New Hampshire."

#### ARTS & ECONOMIC PROSPERITY 5 BEGINS IN ROCHESTER - ROCHESTER, NH JOINS AMERICANS FOR THE ARTS' NATIONAL STUDY OF ECONOMIC IMPACT

Rochester, NH — The Arts Mean Business. That is the message being delivered today by the Rochester Economic Development Office and the Rochester Arts & Cultural Commission, who announced they have joined the Arts & Economic Prosperity 5, a national study measuring the economic impact of nonprofit arts and culture organizations and their audiences. The research study is being conducted by local volunteers and will measure the impact of arts spending on local jobs, community investment and revenue generated and will be compared to the benchmark study in 2011. The Economic Development Office and the Arts & Culture Commission will conduct the project from now through the Fall of 2016. Americans for the Arts will report on the economic analysis and their findings in June 2017. As one of nearly 300 study partners across all 50 states plus the District of Columbia, Rochester will collect detailed data about our local nonprofit arts and culture organizations such as the Rochester Opera House, dance companies and Downtown festivals and events. Karen Pollard, Rochester's Economic Development Manager expects that "the report on local economic impact will be valuable to measure our efforts in Downtown revitalization and our expansion of arts, culture and tourism, all of which are inter-related components of our Creative Economy." The report will be available to the public, but also a useful resource to local businesses and arts organizations as they seek support for new activities.

Rochester will also collect surveys from attendees at arts events using a short, anonymous questionnaire that asks about spending on meals, transportation, dining and shopping specifically as a result of attending the event. Previous studies have shown that the average attendee spends \$24.60 per person, while non-resident Rochester attendees report \$20.40 per person (2011) beyond the cost of admission. Also from the 2011 survey, the city knows that 58.8% of residents who attend a Rochester arts or cultural event would have traveled elsewhere for that experience if necessary, and 69.4% of non-residents agreed. Customized findings for the City of Rochester will include:

- The total dollars spent by Rochester's nonprofit arts organizations. (2011 \$4,322,451)
- The total dollars spent by audiences as a direct result of their attendance at arts and cultural events in the city. (2011 \$3,068,572)
- The number of full-time equivalent jobs supported by arts spending. (2011 215 FTE jobs)



According to Americans for the Arts' **Arts & Economic Prosperity 4**, the most recent national study, the national nonprofit arts industry generated 4.1 million jobs and \$132.5 billion in total economic activity during 2011, demonstrating additional event-related spending pumps revenue into the local economy. Rochester Arts & Cultural Commission Chair Matt Wyatt shares his insight into the project. "Arts programming provides the community with accessible and enriching experiences that bolster public confidence and attract new tenants and investors to Rochester. It's critical we continue to study the economic impact of the arts in order to evolve and improve the cultural landscape of the city. This study could shine a light on different kinds of arts and cultural activity that may be less known or understood." Wyatt is also the curator for the Rochester Museum of Fine Arts and former Chairman of ArtEsprit, a public art organization in Rochester

- <u>Public Library HVAC System</u>: Work has started on this project, and the Community Development Coordinator has conducted on-site Davis-Bacon interviews with the workers.
- Spaulding High School Elevator Project: This project is scheduled to go out to bid in December 2015, and the project is scheduled to occur during the February 2016 or April 2016 school vacation.
- <u>Bicycle Racks</u>: The Community Development Coordinator has continued working on the environmental review for this project.
- CDBG Program
  - <u>FY 2016-2017 Annual Action Plan</u>: The Community Development Coordinator has continued consultations with relevant City staff and public service agencies. The first public hearing for the FY 2016-2017 Annual Action Plan is tentatively scheduled for Tuesday, December 15th.
  - <u>FY 2016-2017 CDBG Grant Applications</u>: The application deadline is Friday, January 8, 2016. The Community Development Coordinator has sent out reminders to a number of grant application recipients.
  - <u>Analysis of Fair Housing</u>: The first public hearing for the Analysis of Fair Housing is tentatively scheduled for Tuesday, December 15th.
  - <u>HUD Form 2516 Report:</u> The City's Form 2516 Report, which tracks contracting with minority-owned and women-owned businesses, for FY 2014-2015 has been submitted

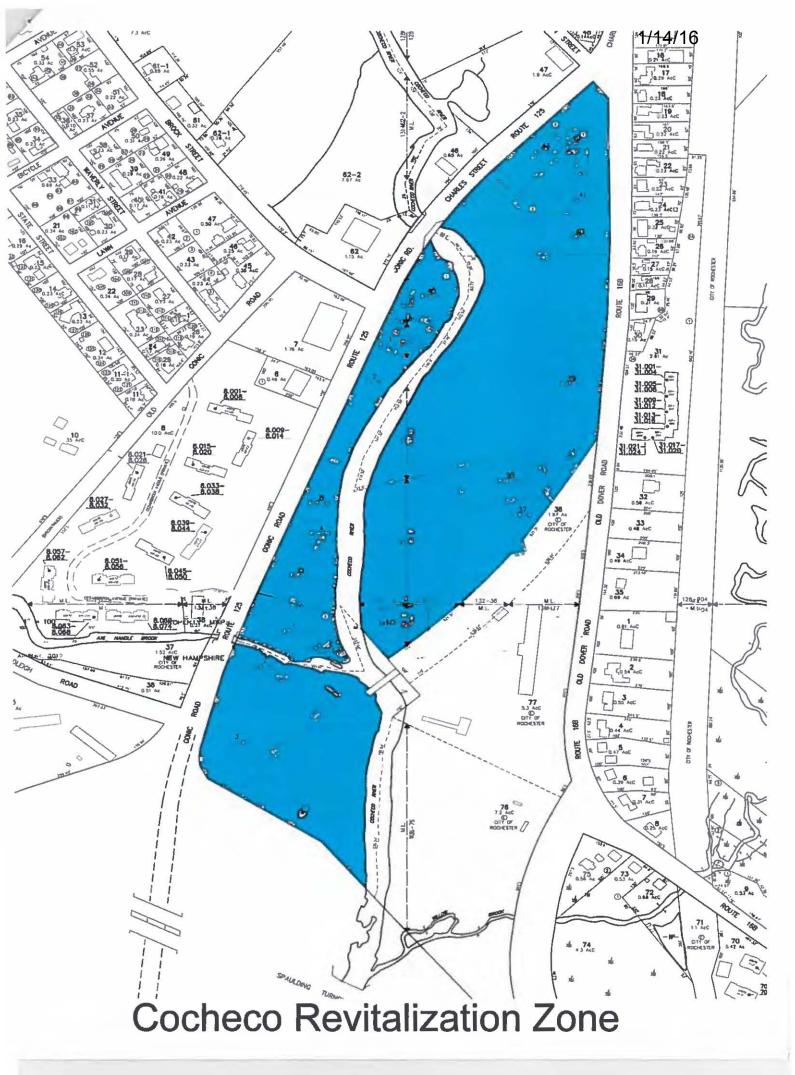


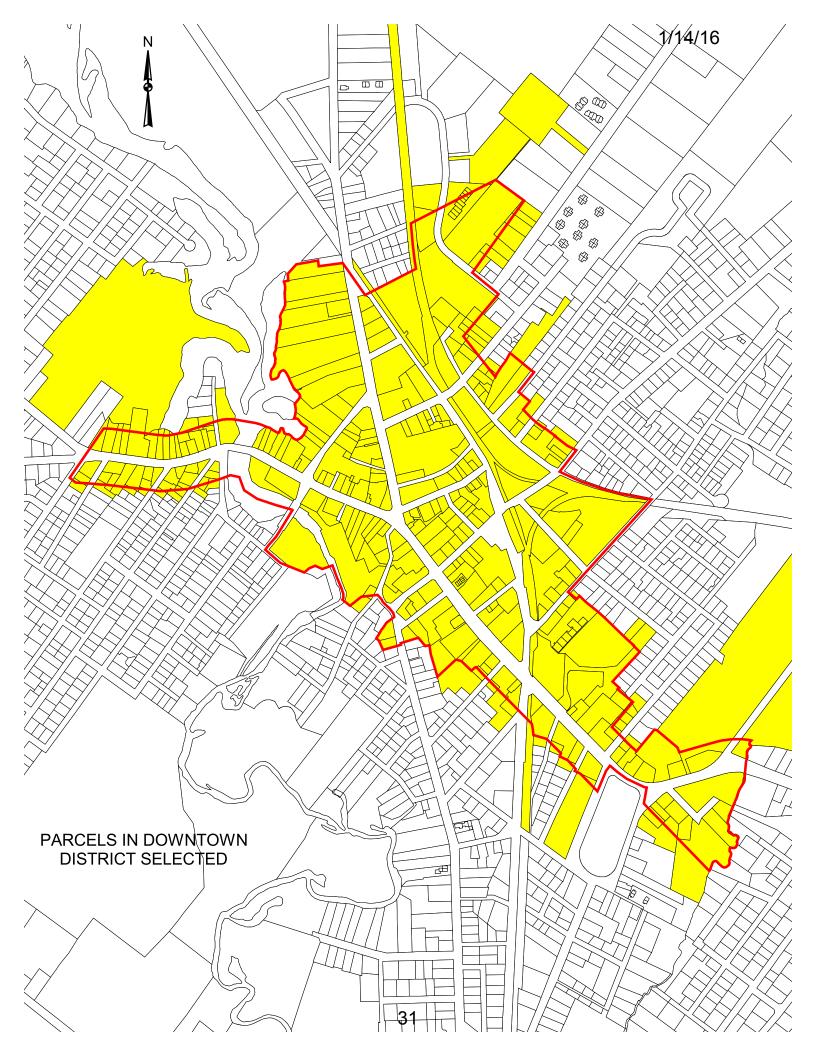
to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). One woman-owned business was contracted using CDBG funds for this time period.

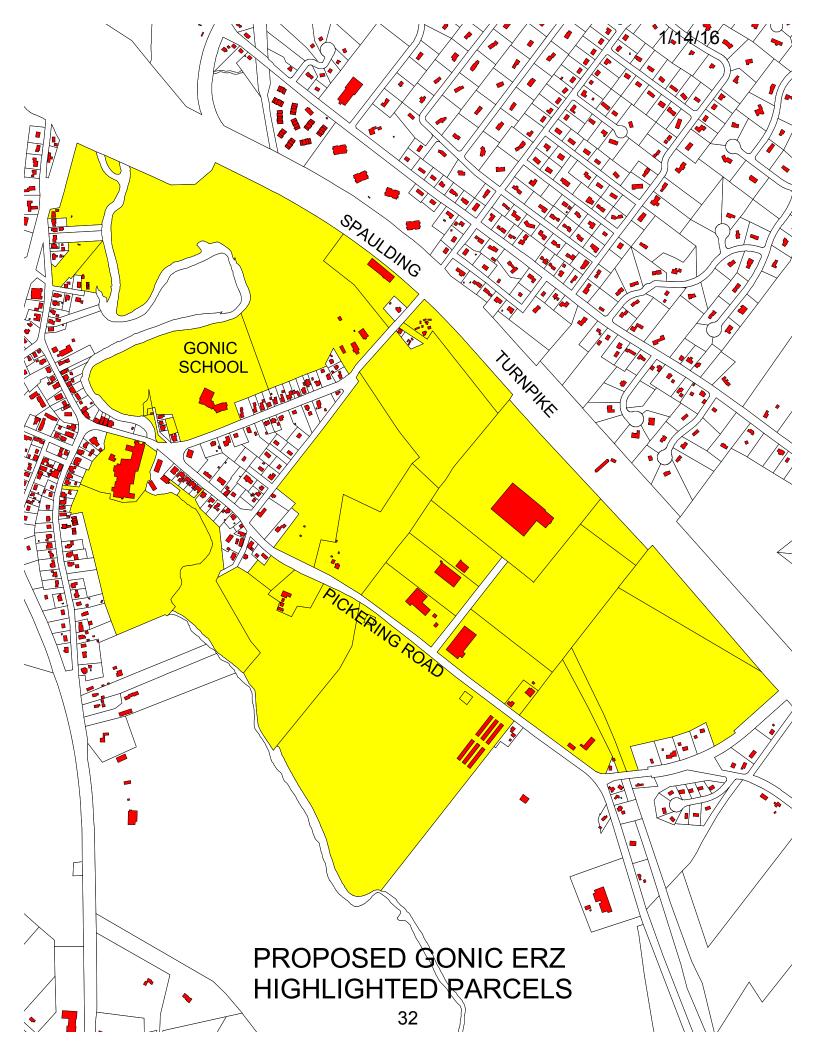
- JOB Loans Program: The JOB Loans Committee has approved a loan application, and the Community Development Coordinator has worked with City staff to arrange for the appropriate paperwork. The Community Development Coordinator has also started the preparation of an environmental review for the loan-related project.
- <u>HUD Spring 2015 Site Visit</u>: HUD has accepted all corrective action that was required from findings identified during the April-May 2015 site visit. (These findings are attached to this report for reference.) The findings will be closed out after the Community Development Coordinator has attended environmental review training; the Community Development Coordinator continues to monitor for upcoming trainings, but none have been offered in the New England region as of yet.
- Other Items
  - <u>Bridging the Gaps:</u> The Community Development Coordinator has been working with the Bridging the Gaps Coordinator to obtain a new company to provide evaluation services. A Request for Proposals has been sent out, and proposals are due by December 17th.
  - Other Grant Activity: The Community Development Coordinator has continued to work with Planning Department staff to pursue funding opportunities for historic restoration work to the City Hall Annex. The Community Development Coordinator also drafted and submitted a grant application on behalf of the Rochester Farmers Market for start-up funding.
  - <u>Courage Wall Proposal</u>: The Courage Wall proposal is attached to the November 2015 agenda packet, and updates on the Courage Wall proposal are included in the November 2015 Community Development Coordinator Report.

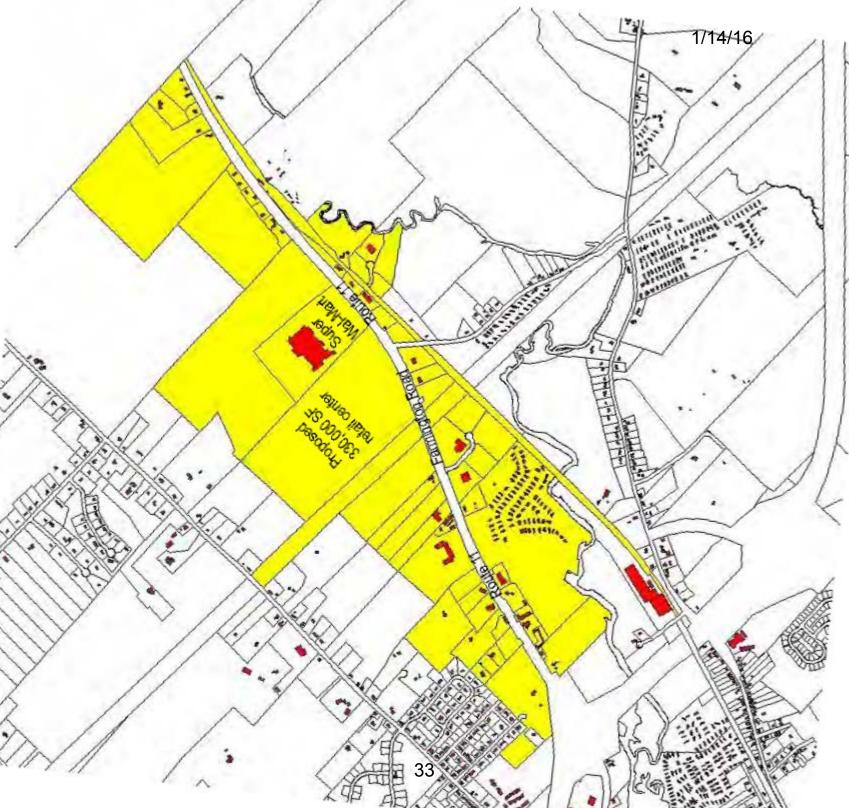

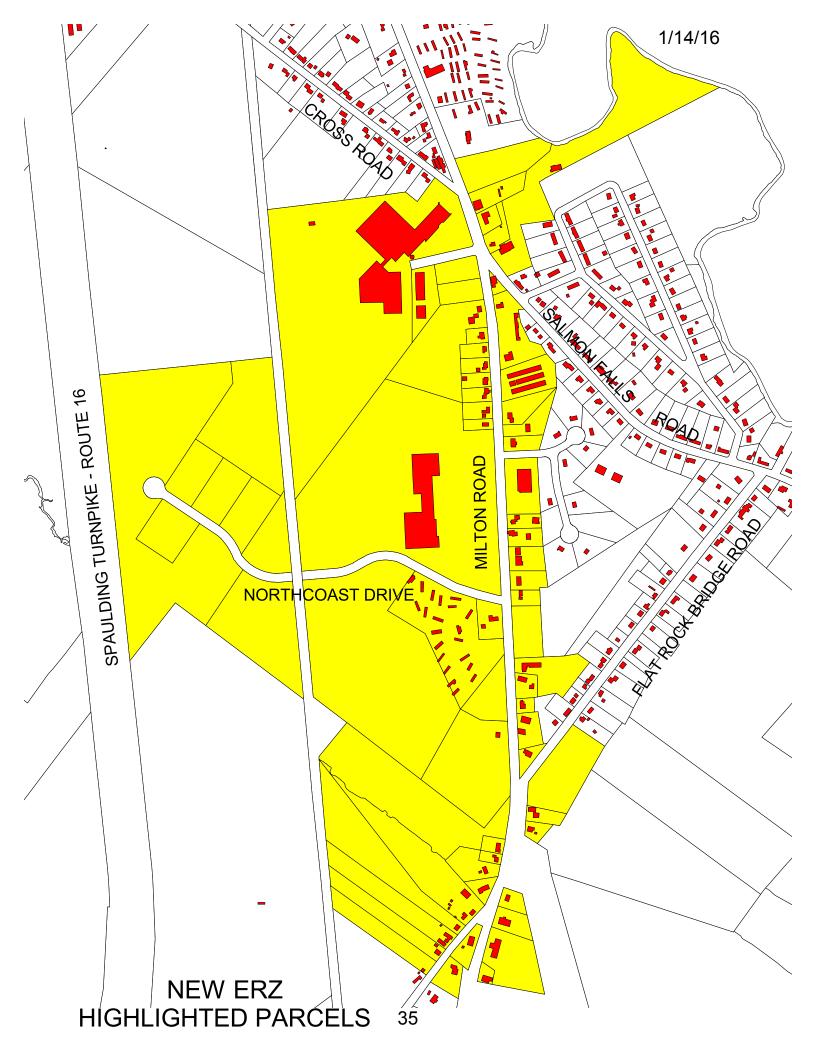

#### MONTHLY REPORT DECEMBER 2015

On behalf of the Fire Department, I am pleased to provide you with the following report. It serves as a summary of the activities, projects and programs underway within the department.

#### **DEPARTMENT INFORMATION:**

During the month of December the Department responded to 218 calls for service. Of those calls this month, 2 calls were for structure fires.

In addition the crews responded to 111 calls for vehicle accidents, and medical calls. We also responded to 5 calls for mutual aid assistance. The remaining calls included everything from alarm activations, good intent calls, and public service calls, as well as a multitude of various other type calls.

Call volume increased only slightly over last year resulting in a 1.6% increase which changed the annual call volume up from 2,560 to 2,601 calls. Fiscal year to fiscal year, which is how our budget is generated, shows a much different picture with FY2015 having 2,759 runs while FY 2014 had 2,369 runs. This indicates that call volume is up over 16%

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:**

I met with John Marzinzik at Frisbie Hospital to discuss various items.

As chairman of the Christmas Tree Lighting I attended this event.

As chairman of the Christmas Parade I helped setup and attended this event.

Staff met with Councilor Elect Ray Barnett and Councilor Elect Tom Willis to go over the Fire Department operations.

Staff met with Owen from Public Works to discuss our generator needs at Station 1.

I attended an E-911 meeting with other City staff to review maps from the State E-911 office.

Staff met with the School Department and the Police Department to discuss and review the Schools Emergency Plans.

Staff attended the opening of the A-1 Japanese Steak House.

#### FIRE PREVENTION:

Fire prevention ended the year with an insurgence of new permits for work issued giving us great momentum moving forward into the new year. As buildings are taking shape on The Ridge, Glenwood Ave and Split Rock Ridge the prevention bureau has been busy with progress and safety inspections. We have been working with the school department training them in the use of newly acquired stair chairs used for evacuating mobility impaired students and completing school inspections along the way. With winter upon us we would like to remind everyone to put safety first when utilizing solid fuel burning appliances and to be sure carbon monoxide detectors are installed where necessary within your homes.

#### **DUTY SHIFT:**

There was 234 hours of training for fulltime fire fighters. The call force had training for the upcoming Seabrook Drill.

#### **EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT:**

I attended an Emergency Management Discovery meeting to discuss the Piscataqua/Salmon Falls Watershed. This meeting was held at the Rochester Community Center.

I attended a meeting at the Rochester Child Care Center with other City staff to look at problems with the riverbank behind their building.

I attended a Strafford County Public Health meeting which was held at Goodwin Health Care in Somersworth.

Myself along with other City staff met to go over maps and fill out a questionnaire on the Piscataqua/Salmon Falls River Watershed. This is a project being conducted by Emergency Management.

### MONTHLY REPORT December 2015

There were a total of 18,656 items circulated with 11,140 people visiting the library in the month of December. Two hundred sixty-one patrons used the library's Internet computers for 1,342 hours. Visitors to the library's web site numbered 9,137. Current number of patron registrations is 35,698. Interlibrary loan activity included 70 materials borrowed from other libraries and 270 loaned to other libraries.

A holiday Wreath-Making program was held on Thursday, December 3<sup>rd</sup> from 10:00am until Noon then 6pm to 8:00pm that night. This was a do it yourself wreath-making event, with the patrons supplying their own wreaths and the library supplying all the decorating materials, including ribbons, glue guns, ornaments, floral wire, etc. Studley's Flower Gardens donated their talents again this year helping to teach and assist people in the art of creating festive bows for the wreaths.

The Library was pleased to host an exhibit of artwork by award winning cartoonist, local artist and member of the library staff, Stephanie Piro. Stephanie Piro is the Saturday chick of the King Features' team of women cartoonists known as the "Six Chix" now in its 15<sup>th</sup> year of syndication. Over the years her work has been published and licensed for a variety of products, for such companies as American Greetings, Papyrus, and Chicken Soup Books. A selection of her current work, including cartoons and illustrations were on display at the library for the month of December.

The library staff graciously hosted another successful Patron Appreciation Day on Tuesday, December 22<sup>nd</sup>. This included pastries, snacks and beverages available throughout the day for all visitors to the library.

In addition to the print versions of available books, 270 of our library patrons downloaded 1,275 e-books to media devices through the library's web site this month. The RPL website also enabled 22 patrons access to Mango Languages and 1,078 songs were downloaded from Freegal Music along with 21 videos from Freegal Movies.

RE: Monthly Report – December 2015

**OPERATIONS**: There were no Ward meetings held in December. Ward 1 has not yet scheduled their next meeting. The remaining Wards are scheduling meetings in January, February and March.

The investigations bureau currently has 78 cases assigned for review or investigation. There were 55 new cases sent up from patrol for review and or investigation. Detectives were called out twice this reporting period, both for untimely death investigations. One arrest was made on a non compliant sex offender. There were 18 cases presented to the Grand Jury and all returned true bills. We logged in 415 pieces of evidence and returned 238 pieces.

**BRIDGING THE GAPS:** The Coalition began planning a community forum series "It Takes a Village" to address substance use in our community. The goals is to provide parents and citizens with information and resources they need to talk to their kids about drugs.

Molly Martuscello attended a meeting of the NH Drug Free Communities grantees to gain more insight and to talk with other coalitions on local programs in NH. Molly also met with the Middle School Guidance and the High School Advisors and Administrators to talk about what the coalition has to offer the school as far as funding and programming for prevention activities and to plan for recruitment and meetings for a High School Youth to Youth. Youth to Youth members recorded three public service announcements about underage drinking and tobacco use.

Five of the nine elementary schools are scheduled to have a Samantha Skunk presentation in the coming months. This is a presentation geared to teach elementary aged kids about medicine safety.

**COMMUNICATIONS:** Training of the new specialists has been going very well. Quarterly meetings have been initiated with Fire and EMS to improve communications between agencies and the center. Addresses and street map verification for E911 have been completed and sent back to the State Emergency management.

## MICHAEL J. ALLEN Chief of Police

**COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT OFFICER**: Officer Miehle has been working with Rotary on the annual fingerprinting program for first graders. He did a presentation to the first graders at the Nancy Loud School about being a police officer. He was involved in several community events and meetings such as the Christmas tree lighting in the square, the parade, Main Street Sidewalk Talk, distributing the feast boxes through housing and the economic development business roundtable meeting.

Officer Miehle met with the Portsmouth PD POP officer to discuss various aspects of their roles. They may develop meetings with other officers serving their communities in the same capacity to share ideas and strategies.

**COMPSTAT:** There were more than 1000 traffic stops for the month. There were 41 arrests from stops. DWI continues to be a focus of our proactive activities.

Property crime is down 31% year to date for total property crimes. There has been a slight increase in the numbers of thefts from motor vehicles. We identified and arrested two suspects for these crimes as well as for several residential burglaries. The numbers of similar incidents has dropped since those arrests.

**DIVERSION:** As part of the Governor's Commission for At-Risk Youth, Nicole has been asked to sit on the Governor's Task Force for the Opiod crisis. Nicole and Molly Martuscello completed training on drug trends and best practices on prevention to local social works. Nicole will be completing training with the Spaulding High staff in January. December's Teen night had a low turnout.

**HONOR GUARD:** The Honor Guard participated in the Chamber Holiday parade as well as a Pearl Harbor Day remembrance at the memorial on City Hall's lawn.

**HOUSING:** Officer Blair attended an eviction hearing. He and other members of the Department assisted with distributing feast baskets to the elderly this period.

**K9:** There were four drug searches and four tracks in the City this period. The team participated in community events including Teen Night, the parade, and an open house at the Veterinary Clinic what works closely with the Working Dog Foundation.

Fina, the Department's first officially certified K9 in many years, who retired at the end of 2012 passed away early Christmas morning after a short illness.

**PROSECUTION:** The workload remains heavy. We have provided 31 hours of support to the office this reporting period to assist with this backload. Lt. Gould had a busy month with 25 new juvenile petitions filed with the court.

**SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS:** Officer Jackson continues to provide coverage to the middle school during the absence of Off. Funk. We are looking forward to Off. Funk's return in January. The Explorer Post has been working on use of force topics.

**ADMINISTRATIVE:** Budget season is upon us and we spent the month of December preparing our CIP and O&M budgets for FY17.

Overall the FY16 budget is looking good. There are some line items we are watching such as vehicle maintenance. The insurance deductible from accidents comes from this line which has caused this to be over expended. In overtime, with comp time pay out we are projected to be over in this line. We watch this line closely by analyzing overtime usage weekly.

We went out to bid again for vehicle repairs. The relationship we had with Hagan's wasn't meeting our needs.

We still have two officer vacancies. We will hold a physical agility process on January 9, 2016 for a new hiring process. 200 invitations have been sent for this initial phase of testing. The next Academy is not until May of 2016 and we are again putting out requests for certified candidates.

Officer Arrajj is in the final weeks of her field training program. She is scheduled to be released to solo patrol in January.

We conducted more than 300 hours of training during the month of December. A large portion was dedicated to certifying four new field training officers. Our CIT Officers were also recertified. We completed annual re certification on the department rifles and shotguns. The report we send to Police Standards and Training was completed and submitted well before deadline.

Sgt. Cost organized a Gang Intervention regional training. He is also scheduling a regional training on Social Media Awareness and Juvenile Crime to be held in January. This day long course will educate officers on the intervention process as well as the impact and dynamics of social media and juvenile criminal activity

### EMD USE:

There was one Taser deploy and no Taser displays this period.

### FORFEITURE FUND SPENDING:

There was no forfeiture spending this period.

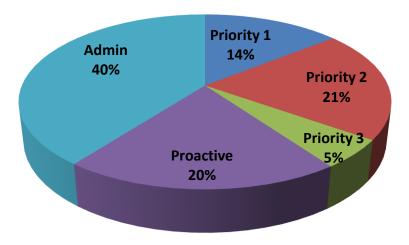
## **Accidents by Ward**



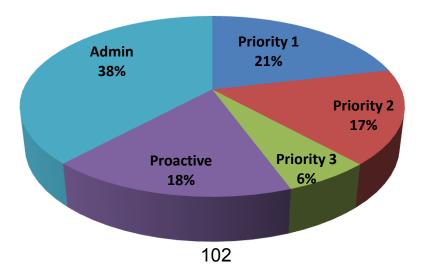

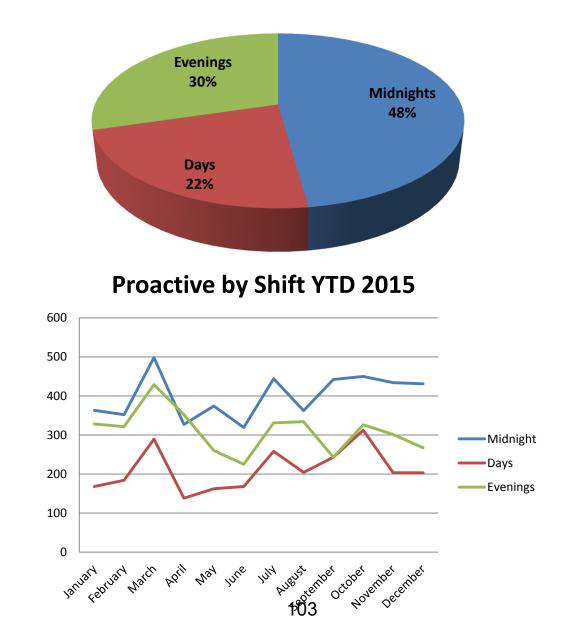
## **Manpower Hours November 2015**

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## ROCHESTER DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS MONTHLY REPORT FOR DECEMBER 2015

#### HIGHWAY, FLEET MAINTENANCE AND UTILITIES

Highway Division responded to an average number of 26 service calls which have either completed or scheduled for repair. Service calls for the month included sign repairs and plowing issues. General maintenance included catch basin and storm drain cleaning and repairs to two storm drain basins. Staff continued to make marks on payment for locating drains for maintenance during the winter conditions. There was one snow plowing event resulting in 5" of snow and one night of snow pick up downtown, and one ice event require road salt treatment. The Downtown decorations were completed and staff assisted with both the tree light event and the Christmas Parade. The mechanics completed the installation of all plows and sanders and built a wood chipper box for truck #23.

The Utilities Division responded to 22 requests for service in the month of December. Staff performed regular maintenance on the water and sewer systems including the cleaning of the troubled sewers and the siphons. Staff cleaned out a few water shut offs and raised them up to ground level. Staff assisted the Utility Billing Office with enforcement of the backflow ordinances. They were out tagging businesses and marking out shut offs. Staff repaired a hydrant dripping on Grove St., and one on Salmon Falls Rd. that was damaged by a motor vehicle accident. A snow event at the end of the month had staff plowing and removing snow from downtown before New Year's Eve to allow better access to businesses. All unnecessary equipment and vehicles have been winterized and stored for the winter.

#### **BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS**

Buildings and Grounds responded to 73 service orders in the month of December, all except for 3 of them have been completed. Requests included delivering supplies, working on heat issues in different buildings, repairing doors, plumbing and light fixtures. This division completed the remodeling of a storage closet and hallway and converted them into two office spaces at City Hall. We finished the installation of the HVAC Project at the Library and we coordinated the carpet replacement in Council Chamber and the entry way at the Library. Staff painted the black baseboard trim on all levels of City Hallwork is nearly completed in the boys locker room at the Community Center. The Library painting project has started. City Staff will be repainting the entire inside of the Library. We started with the top floor of the newer section and we will continue on to the first floor.

#### WATER TREATMENT PLANT

Treated water volume for the month of December 2015 was approximately 47.8 million gallons from the surface water treatment plant. All water quality testing and monitoring was completed in accordance with NHDES requirements. We are pleased to report that the City of Rochester again met and exceeded all State and Federal standards for drinking water. Heavy rains filled all but the main reservoir to capacity, which was limited due to continuing work on the spillway. Decreasing temperature and dissolved oxygen concentrations have necessitated minor pretreatment process adjustments. Watershed inspections were conducted on Rochester Reservoir, Round Pond, Berry Dam, Tufts Pond, and the Whalebacks. Equipment and grounds maintenance was performed at the plant, well, and tanks/stations. The well remained offline for

maintenance of the aerators and flow balancing at the surface water plant. Maintenance at the WTF included snow removal, flow meter calibration, replacement of a caustic transfer pump, peristaltic tubing replacement, and repair of the intake building sample lines. Contractors performed repairs on the Cocheco Well, Industrial way, and Richardson Street pump station generators, and replaced the treatment plant boiler blower motor. This month we took delivery of the replacement Kubota tractor, carport, and field/lab multiparameter analyzer. The water storage tank project progress to date included returning Chesley Hill to full service; fencing replacement; and punch list review. Filter upgrade work to date included continued performance testing of filters, manual caustic injection washing, and borescoping & cleaning of sand laterals; ceiling tile and lighting installation; and punch list items. Pending work includes floor coatings, access hatch protection, floc retention analysis, and record drawing review.

#### WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY

Items that were completed during the month of December: We continue to work with the coalition of communities on related wastewater and Great Bay Estuary issues. Staff is working with industries on pretreatment issues. We started phosphorous pilot removal study findings report. Staff attended state sponsored training classes. We started to develop bid documents for installation of disk filters. We received notification that the Homeland Security Grant application for security cameras at the WWTF has been awarded. The annual NHDES groundwater monitoring report is complete. General maintenance and repairs to HVAC system was performed. The WWTF is working with consultant on pump station upgrades. The floating wetland pilot study findings report has been started. We are working on FY17 O&M and CIP budget requests. Staff performed preventative and corrective maintenance on equipment, machinery and instrumentation. All required testing for the EPA and State completed and submitted. Average effluent flow for the month = 2.931 Million Gallons per Day (MGD). Percent of design flow = 58.3. Percent of design flow for 2015 = 56.6%. Precipitation = 4.42"

### ENGINEERING

- **Granite Ridge Public Outlay**: Buried infrastructure is completed. Water booster station is nearing completion. Final pavement overlay will be installed after the 2015-2016 winter season.
- Water Storage Tank Rehabilitation: Construction is substantially complete. Final items to be completed in spring 2016.
- **Surface Water Treatment Plant Upgrades**: Construction is nearly complete; Substantial Completion is anticipated in January 2016.
- Catherine St./Sheridan Ave./Knight St. Area Improvements: All buried infrastructure improvements and most surface improvements are completed. Construction activity has ceased for the winter. Final pavement overlays and project completion are anticipated in spring/early summer 2016.
- Rochester Reservoir West End Spillway Modifications: Construction completion is anticipated in early January 2016.
- Salmon Falls Road/Milton Road Water and Sewer (EDA Project): All permits and easements have been obtained. Final design documents are under review by EDA. Anticipate advertisement for bids during winter 2015-2016 and construction to begin in spring/early summer 2016.

- Howard Brook Culverts Replacement: Finalizing design. Anticipate construction in 2016.
- Franklin St./Western Ave. Area Improvements: Finalizing design and permitting. Anticipate advertisement for bids during winter of 2015-2016 and construction start in 2016. Project scope now includes rebuilding the roadway and utilities in portions of Franklin St. and Western Ave. and constructing the new Western Ave. sewer pump station. Rebuilding the roadway and utilities in First-Fifth Streets and Adams Avenue will be proposed for the next construction phase in a future project.
- Salmon Falls Rd. HSIP Curve Softening Project: Working with property owners to obtain necessary temporary and permanent construction easements. Construction of this project is currently anticipated for 2016. The future of this project is uncertain due to challenges with obtaining easements and availability of federal funding.
- Strafford Square Roundabout: Design continues. Based on the current status, bidding of the roundabout construction is anticipated in late 2016, with a spring 2017 construction start date. Prior to that contract, a utility infrastructure contract may be undertaken during the 2016 construction season. Approval for demolition of the building at 2-4 Walnut Street is still pending.
- Wakefield Street Reconstruction: 30% design documents completed. Final Design and Construction funds were approved in the FY16 budget.
- **Colonial Pines Sewer Extension**: Design continues on the first phase of this multi-phase sewer extension program. Construction funds are proposed in the CIP budget over the next few years for future phases.
- **Wastewater Interceptor Upgrades:** A Basis of Design Report has been received from the design consultant. This report summarizes alternatives and sets design criteria for final design.
- **Lowell Street Culvert:** Drainage infrastructure improvements have been completed. Further improvements to the culvert are being contemplated for construction in 2016.
- **Dewey Street Pedestrian Bridge:** Bridge inspection, rating, and evaluations have been completed. Design of a replacement bridge structure is underway.
- Columbus Avenue (Rte. 125) Pedestrian Bridge: This bridge was added to the NHDOT's Municipal Red List of deficient bridge structures in August. The bridge has been closed and design/construction of a replacement bridge is being expedited. The existing bridge was removed in November. Installation of the new bridge is anticipated in January 2016.
- NPDES Permit Wastewater & MS4 Permit Stormwater: Early in 2015, Rochester agreed to certain conditions with USEPA in exchange for additional time before a new NPDES permit is issued for its Wastewater Treatment Facility. The terms of the conditions include such activities as sampling, conducting studies, and development of plans related to nutrient reduction. The City continues to comply with the conditions. The City continues to await issuance of a new MS4 permit for stormwater. USEPA is currently reviewing comments submitted on their draft language; issuance of the MS4 permit is anticipated for spring 2016 or later.
