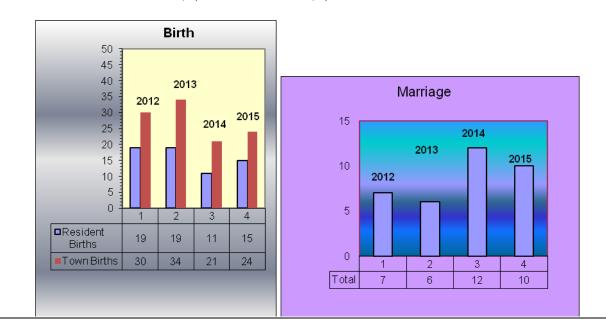

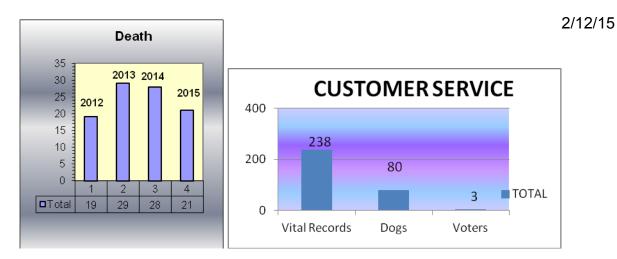
Vital Statistics

Code Compliance Deficiencies

There are up to four steps of actions being used to deal with complaints/ violations: The first being verbal contact. The next method is a written notice of violation. This consists of a notice that is mailed first class as well as certified mail giving the property owner or violator a detailed description of the deficiencies and a date to make the appropriate corrections. The requested date depends on the time that is considered reasonable for the requested action that needs corrected, for instance, a minor repair to a fence may warrant a couple of days, while replacing an entire fence may require a few weeks. If there has been no contact made by the recipient of the notice, a follow up inspection is then made. If the violation(s) still exist, a second notice of violation is mailed with a new correction date on it. This process is then followed through again with a final notice. If the violation has still not been corrected after these notices, the paper work is turned over to Attorney Grossman for legal/court action to be taken. If the violation was a time sensitive issue, such as trash piling up, we would skip the second notice and go straight to a final notice to help expedite the process.

Rochester Economic Development January 2014 Overview



- Staffing Jennifer Murphy Aubin continues out on maternity leave until mid-March. Carolyn Kessinger from Kelly Services has been helping with the basic administrative duties in Jennifer's absence. Julian Long completed his introductory Community Development Block Grant training with Adam Cannon from Portsmouth, and still has Elena Engle available should questions arise. Karen Pollard took a week of vacation in early January, and has been named to the International Economic Development Council's Education and Certification Advisory Committee.
- **REDC Spaulding Turnpike/Route 16 Coalition** Foster's Daily Democrat published a series of articles on the history of the Spaulding Turnpike, Exit 10 and the region's businesses interests in seeing planning for Exit 10 and further turnpike planning and improvements. NHDOT does not currently have a Commissioner, so communication has been difficult on any issues of substance, such as the NHDOT budget.
- Business Visitation Program Jennifer Marsh has been continuing visits to local employers and this month she met with the new President of Frisbie Hospital, Tom Cusano of SAI Industrial, Steve Dumont from the Gonic Mill, and a number of small businesses in Downtown that are struggling this winter. In addition, Jenn continues to serve on the Rochester Main Street Economic Restructuring Committee, the Restaurant Event Committee and a number of other groups to support small business in Rochester.
- Seacoast Manufacturing Exchange Jenn Marsh organized and facilitated her first Exchange on January 21st and held at TurboCam's new building in Barrington. There were 26 people in attendance and the speaker was the Director of Energy from NH Public Utilities Commission. It was a very successful event and the next will be held in early April.
- **Business Roundtable** Newton Kershaw, of Elm Grove Properties, spoke at this month's business roundtable meeting to help educate the business owners on how the 79e tax relief program benefits them if they are successful in their application. Newton has had two projects approved under this statute. There was a much larger attendance than usual to hear him speak.
 - **TIF Annual Advisory Board Meeting** The GSBP TIF Board met on July 30, and Jenn Marsh completed the 2013 DRAFT TIF Report and the 2014 TIF Report. The department will be asking for a dedicated page on the city website for official TIF information and reports, which Jenn will also maintain.
 - Rochester Economic Development Commission The Commission sent a suggestion to the Mayor and City Council regarding the co-locating of development departments. They continue to advocate for co-location and suggested a downtown storefront that is particularly well suited in good condition as a temporary space solution. The City Council will discuss this at a future meeting. Jenn Marsh is taking on the staff support role for the Commission with the January meeting.
 - FY 2016 Economic & Community Development Budgets All department budgets were submitted on time and with minimal changes, only those to accommodate actual cost changes. Numerous Downtown improvements were entered into the CIP for FY16 or future years. It is hoped that one is chosen for funding.
 - Marketing and Public Relations Ads and PR this month: Redesign of Community Development webpage; PR Pollard Named to IEDC Committee; *Area Development* Site Selectors Directory 2015, ad & listings; *Business Facilities*, listing; Expansion Solutions, ad & editorial.

Education and Certification Advisory Committee for 2015 through 2017

Education and Certification Advisory Committee The Education and Certification Advisory Committee assists in the development of new CEcD exam content and provides input to help shape the relevancy and content of professional development courses, including advanced courses. The committee monitors complementary and competitive education offerings by outside groups within the economic development industry. The work of this committee will include reviewing CEcD applications in which the candidate's eligibility cannot be clearly determined by staff; disputed "failed" results of the CEcD exam; applications for level two re-certification credits; and applications for Basic Economic Development Course accreditation. The committee will oversee the Re-accreditation of Basic Economic Development Courses on a 3-year cycle. This Committee reports to the Board's Performance Oversight and Monitoring Committee. The Education and Certification Committee meets four times a year: an in person meeting at the annual conference and three conference calls throughout the year.

Member Tenure: Committee members serve a three year term, after which the member must rotate off that committee. Each year one third of the committee is up for renewal and the same number of new members rotate on per year.

CITY OF ROCHESTER, NH Granite State Business Park Tax Increment Finance District (RSA 162K) 2013 Report

Tax Increment Financing: Overview

Cutbacks in federal and state infrastructure aid over the last two decades have minimized the amount of financing available to municipalities for infrastructure, increasing the use of tax increment financing (TIF), an economic development tool that has been around since the 1950's. The creation of TIF districts are crucial to New England towns and cities that compete with the financial incentives offered in other regions of the United States.

The underlining concept of a TIF District is that an area with development potential that is blighted or otherwise in need of economic improvement, becomes designated by a municipality as a tax increment financing district. The improvements made to the infrastructure stimulate development or redevelopment, which in turn generates incremental tax revenues. These revenues are then directed to the infrastructure debt service incurred by the municipality for the improvements.

The taxable valuation of the district is frozen at the time of its creation, referred to as the original taxable value (OTV) or simply "base." Tax revenues from the base value continue to go to the general fund tax base. As the TIF district matures and private sector development and redevelopment occurs due to improvements, the City retains the incremental tax revenues generated above the base. The annual "tax increment" is used to pay the public expenditures on improvements in the district. The duration of a TIF district is limited, typically by the time required to amortize bonded debt and the recovery of other municipal costs incurred in creating the TIF district and provide public infrastructure.

Public infrastructure investments typically include water supply, sewer expansion and repair, storm water drainage, street and sidewalk construction, street lighting, park improvements, and parking structures. These improvements are intended to make the area more attractive for development and reduce infrastructure costs to private developers.

Granite State Business Park TIF District- (RSA 162K)

District Activity for 2013:

The Granite State Business Park (GSBP) is located in the southeastern portion of Rochester adjacent to the Skyhaven Airport. A new bridge and extension of the new "Innovation Drive" is now in use, providing access to the northeast end of the Business Park, the new home of Safran Aerospace Composites.

Between January 1, 2013 and December 31, 2013 internal improvements continued within several buildings located in the Granite State Business Park:

NCS Global, previously known as Newport Computers, has moved into their new building at 32 Innovation Drive bringing with them approximately 30 employees. The new building was constructed to LEED standards, and as such will be the first of its kind in the city. LEED stands for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design and was developed by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) to set a benchmark for design, construction, and operation of high-performance green buildings. In addition to the construction of the 30,000 square foot building, plumbing and mechanical work were completed in 2013 to prepare the building for use.

Improvements were made to the Albany building located at 112 Airport Drive including a new generator, interior electrical and mechanical work and fire suppression work. Heating and cooling, gas piping and fire protection work was completed on the new Safran building on Innovation Drive.

An Advisory Board has been appointed and their duties adopted by the Rochester City Council. The Board is scheduled to meet at the end of January, 2014 to review the Annual Report and make recommendations on next year's activity to the Mayor and City Council.

Goals for the Next Year:

Water system improvements are necessary for the future expansion and water security for investors in the park. A connecting or "looping" water system is needed from 216 Airport Drive, extending up Shaw Drive and connecting to the water system in Whitehall Road. This will be an FY15 CIP request and if undertaken as a TIF project, will require changes to the TIF Map and Financing Plan.

As businesses such as Albany Engineered Composites, Safran Aerospace Composites, Newport Computers and Phase 2 Medical grow within the Granite State Business Park, so will the need to accommodate the employees of the GSBP who already have a 24/7 presence. Albany and Phase 2 Medical is already working on 3 shifts and Safran will be adding a 3rd shift shortly.

The business park currently lacks street lights on Airport Drive and sidewalks from Rochester Hill Road (Route 108) into the park, creating an unsafe commute for those employed in the business park. The only bus stop available to those taking public transportation is located outside the GSBP on Route 108.

To best accommodate the growth of these businesses and to encourage new business in the GSBP, the following items will be priority goals for next year.

- Water Loop to Whitehall Road
- Street Lights installed on Airport Drive
- Sidewalks constructed from Route 108 into the park
- Construction of a sheltered bus stop inside the GSBP
- ▶ New signage for the entrance to the Business Park

The annual "tax increment" is used to pay the public expenditures on improvements in the district. The duration of a TIF district is typically limited by the time required to amortize bonded debt and the recovery of other municipal costs incurred in creating the TIF district and provide public infrastructure.

Public infrastructure investments typically include water supply, sewer expansion and repair, storm water drainage, street and sidewalk construction, street lighting, park improvements, and parking structures. These improvements are intended to make the area more attractive for development and reduce infrastructure costs to private developers.

Granite State Business Park TIF District- (RSA 162K)

District Activity for 2014:

The Granite State Business Park (GSBP) is located in the southeastern portion of Rochester adjacent to the Skyhaven Airport. Extensive improvements have been made to three buildings in FY14, those are as follows:

The Frisbee Foundation building located at 88 Airport Drive added an addition to the building which also prompted permits to be pulled for additional fire protection, plumbing, electrical and the addition of generator power. Total investments for improvements were estimated at \$346,100. The Albany International building located at 112 Airport Drive applied for interior renovation permits as well which required extensive electrical work. Total investments for improvements were estimated at \$280,000.

Rand Whitney located at 216 Airport Drive completed some major renovations and an addition to their building in which additional fire protection and electrical work were required. Total investments for improvements were estimated at \$1,206,600.

Safran Aerospace Composites is located right outside RSA TIF 162-K in RSA TIF 205, and they completed extensive improvements at 85 Innovation Drive. These included interior renovation, plumbing, fire protection and the addition of a new heating system. Total investments for improvements were estimated at \$994,300. Additions and improvements do impact RSA TIF 162-k by adding numerous employees that use the bridge and park streets.

An Advisory Board has been appointed and their duties adopted by the Rochester City Council. The Board will meet to review the Annual Report to make recommendations on next year's activity to the Mayor and City Council.

Advisory Committee Endorsement:

Water system improvements needed for future expansion and water security for investors in the park include connecting or "looping" the water system from 216 Airport Drive, extending up Shaw Drive and connecting to the water system in Whitehall Road. This will be an FY16 CIP request and if undertaken as a TIF project, will require changes to the TIF Map and Financing Plan.

As businesses such as Albany Engineered Composites, Newport Computers and Phase 2 Medical grow within the Granite State Business Park, so will the need to accommodate the employees of the GSBP who already have a 24/7 presence. Albany and Phase 2 Medical are already working on 3 shifts. Safran Aerospace Composites has additional impacts on the traffic and safety of the park because their entrance to the site is through the main entrance of the park and they will also be adding additional employees and a 3^{rd} shift.

The business park currently lacks street lights and sidewalks from Rochester Hill Road (Route 108), up Innovation Drive to the bridge, and along Airport Drive into the park. The only bus stop available to those taking public transportation is located outside the GSBP on Route 108, which is quite a distance from most of these buildings. Adding additional lighting, sidewalks and a bus stop will enhance both vehicular and foot traffic in the park.

To best accommodate the growth of these businesses and to encourage new business in the GSBP, the following projects will be priority for the next year.

- Water Loop to Whitehall Road
- Street Lights installed on Airport Drive
- Sidewalks constructed within the park
- Identification of a location and construction of a sheltered and well lit bus stop inside the GSBP

Land has been identified to create a Phase 3 to the Granite State Business Park. This is currently being pursued outside the confines for the TIF District Map or Financing Plan.

facilities — anywhere from 300,000 to one million square feet and above for the purposes of being within a day's proximity of their consumer base. "

Amazon.com has built fulfillment centers across the

country, including two in New England: one in Nashua, New Hampshire, and the newest center in Windsor, Connecticut, which will employ 300 workers. In December 2013, Coast to Coast Fulfillment, a third-party logistics provider, completed a 29,000-square-foot expansion of its orderprocessing center in West Greenwich, Rhode Island. The company now has about 82,000 square feet of warehouse and office space. The center will handle the staging for all outbound shipments.

"With this additional space, we will have many more pick lines operating at the same time, processing hundreds of products destined for several different chain stores simultaneously," says Client Services Manager Randy Lundquist. "Also, now that we are an FDA-registered facility, we can process over-the-counter (OTC) drug and food supplement orders."

Meeting Workforce Needs

Despite all the positive news, one of the biggest challenges for companies emerging from the recession is finding enough qualified workers for their expanded production needs. This is especially true for advanced manufacturing. A complicating issue is out-migration — more people are leaving parts of New

The advanced manufacturing sector is expected to grow five times faster than the manufacturing industry as a whole over the next ten years.

The manufacturing industry generally provides higher than average wages to its employees. The wages of advanced manufacturing employees, however, are even higher, with average wages in advanced manufacturing 13% higher than wages in the manufacturing industry as a



Commuting Patterns of the Rochester, NH Area

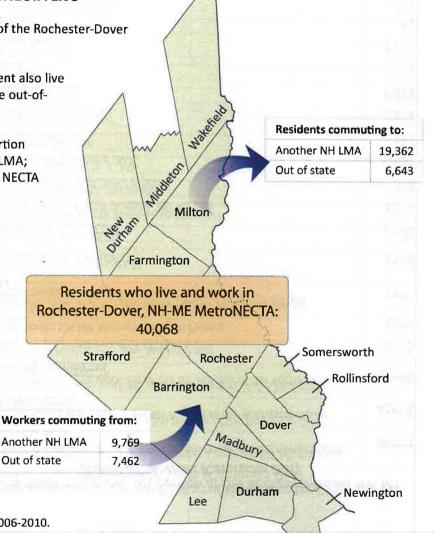

MONTHLY REPORT JANUARY 2015

On behalf of the Fire Department, I am pleased to provide you with the following report. It serves as a summary of the activities, projects and programs underway within the department.

DEPARTMENT INFORMATION:

During the month of January the Department responded to 253 calls for service. Of those calls this month, 5 calls were for minor fires including chimney fires, vehicle fires and boiler malfunctions.

In addition the crews responded to 120 calls for vehicle accidents, and medical calls. We also responded to 3 calls for mutual aid assistance. The remaining calls included everything from alarm activations, good intent calls, and public service calls, as well as a multitude of various other type calls.

Call volume is up just slightly with 7 additional runs this month over last, or about 2.8%. In January of 2014 there were 244 calls which indicate a 3.7% increase this January over the same period last year.

ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:

I attended the monthly cost containment meeting.

I met with call force Captain Adam Hughes to discuss new hires that he was recommending. We also discussed firefighting gear and helmets for the call force.

FIRE PREVENTION:

Welcome to Winter! The recent heavy snow fall can present several safety issues. Remember to shovel out all vents for heaters, keep the secondary exit clear of snow, and use all generators safely. Also, don't forget that snow can present quite a weight load on your roof. Be safe!

DUTY SHIFT:

There were 15 training sessions for the fulltime firefighters. All firefighters fulltime and call received specialized training in the new Self Contained Breathing Apparatus.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT:

I attended a regional emergency shelter meeting which was held at Goodwin Healthcare in Somersworth.

Staff met with Julia Chase and Mark Mudge from NH Emergency Management to discuss critical infrastructure protection program.

MONTHLY REPORT January 2015

There were a total of 18,576 items circulated with 10,498 people visiting the library in the month of January. Two hundred seventy patrons used the library's Internet computers for 1,406 hours. Visitors to the library's web site numbered 8,771. Current number of patron registrations is 34,541. Interlibrary loan activity included 44 materials borrowed from other libraries and 313 loaned to other libraries.

Winter story times began in the Children's Room on the week of January 5th. Fifteen story times were held throughout the month with over two hundredeleven children in attendance.

The Children's Room welcomed Susan Schake on January 10th for a workshop featuring one of the projects from her latest "Art Lab for Kids" books. All the children attending were able to create a "Wintery Paper Trees" collage.

The Library was pleased to present the work of contemporary Rochester artist, Beth Wittenberg in the month of January. She received a MFA from Maryland Institute College of Art with an emphasis on sculpture and painting. Wittenberg says she is influenced by art brute, outsider art, children's art, craft, and her mother's very large antique collection of Aynsley Fine Bone China. She considers herself a colorist and finds that colors seem brighter and more vibrant on the Seacoast.

January proved to be a busy month in library circulation. Monday, January 26th brought the new highest circulation total of 1,351 checked-out items for the Adult Circulation Desk. This number does not include the 1,100 items that were returned and checked back into the system that same day. This broke the previous record of 1,210 items checked-out on August 23, 2010.

In addition to the print versions of available books, 282 of our Library patrons downloaded 1,205 e-books to media devices through the library's web site this month. The RPL website also enabled 33 patrons access to Mango Languages.

MONTHLY REPORT FOR JANUARY 2015

NEWS FROM THE DEPARTMENT HEAD

The Planning Department received a flurry of new inquiries in January. Several of these inquires centered around what would be required to reactive several older projects that have been sitting idle; because these older projects pre-date all of the current Planning Staff, and involve State RSA's regarding 'vesting', providing answers to these inquires proved to be time-consuming and methodical; but, Staff is excited to see there is interest in finishing these projects.

Staff also met with developers/agents to discuss new potential development projects, which are not yet public. Staff expects these proposals to be formally submitted in the next two to three months.

- The Planning Board met, reviewed, and approved three new applications (listed in the succeeding section). The Board's "Annual Retreat" workshop was cancelled due to snow; it has not yet been rescheduled.
- The Planning Staff attended various meetings and workshops throughout the month of January. They continued to work on a change of use from a restaurant and stove shop to a physical therapy office located at 393 Gonic Road, and was able to issue an approval. They also worked to "un-merge" a property that was involuntarily merged in the 1980's. Staff also attended meetings on the Aquifer Protection Ordinance update, the GIS Working Group, the CIP, Sign Ordinance rewrite, a special meeting with the Historic Commission revolving around saving the old Police Station, and a specialized conference on walk-ability.

RE: Monthly Report – January 2015

OPERATIONS: Four of the six wards met this period. No residents attended the January 7 Ward 5 meeting. All other wards had good turnout of residents, elected officials and invited guests. Topics discussed included community development and city construction projects, year-end comp stat results, scams and frauds, heroin epidemic and strategies to combat it, substance abuse treatment, motor vehicle enforcement, and panhandling.

There were 51 cases sent up from patrol to the Detective unit for review and or investigation. We logged 445 pieces of evidence and returned 75 pieces to owners. There was a call out for one drug overdose. There was a search warrant of a home where 130 marijuana plants in various stages of growth were seized.

COMP STAT: The year-end comp stat report card shows a 5% decrease in property crime. All property crime numbers were down, with the exception of shoplifting which was up 5% and vandalism which was up 6%. Our closure rate in all property crime categories either increased, or stayed the same in some categories. We did see increases in all violent crime categories.

COMMUNICATIONS: One of the two open positions is scheduled to be filled in early February.

K9: There were two tracks and one drug search in Rochester. Officer MacKenzie has been chosen as the American Legion Officer of the Year for New Hampshire. He has also been nominated for consideration as the National American Legion Officer of the year.

PROSECUTION: The new Attorney Prosecutor Joe Plaia has completed the background and will be starting on February 2, 2015. He will get some training and be acclimated to the Department. Two officers will be redeployed to patrol at shift change at the end of February. An issue with our records management software has caused a backlog. We will continue to use the parking enforcement officer two hours per day to assist.

Bids for ballistic vests were opened. We recommend awarding the bid to Gall's which met the specifications and is the low bidder at \$638.00 per vest. We will seek half of that amount in reimbursement through the vest grant.

We recorded 54 hours of training this period. The majority was for TASER recertification.

EMD USE:

There were one Taser display and one Taser deploy this period.

FORFEITURE FUND SPENDING:

There was no forfeiture spending this period.

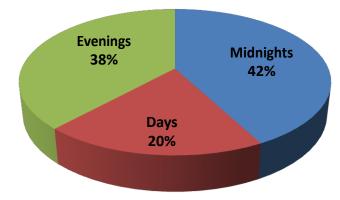

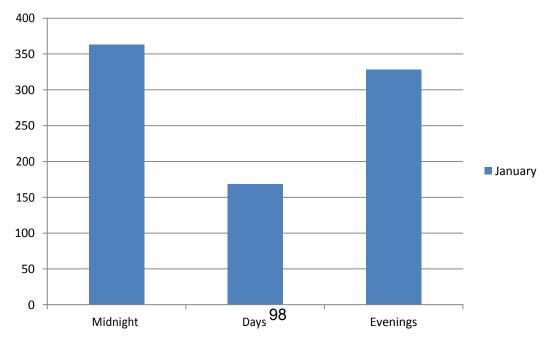

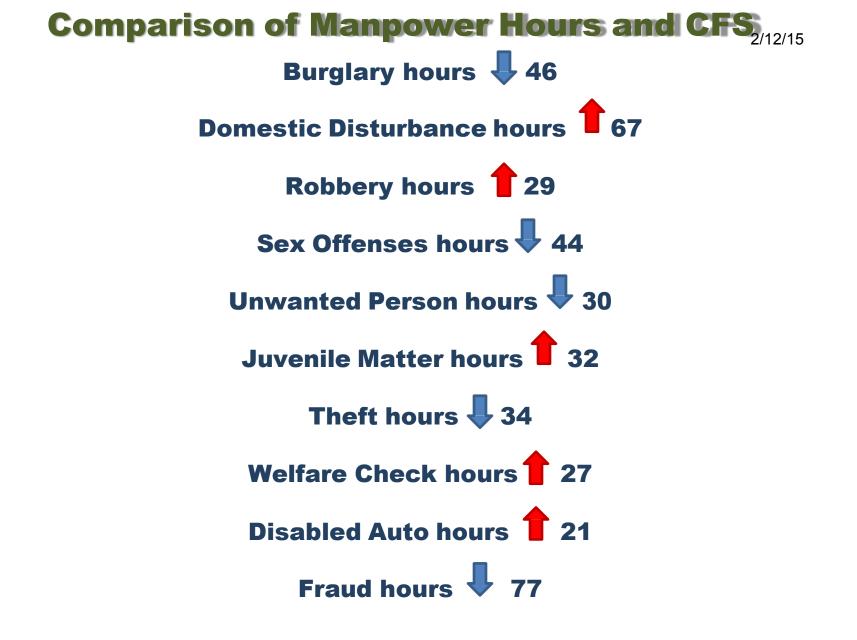


Proactive by Shift January 2015

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ROCHESTER DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS MONTHLY REPORT FOR JANUARY 2015

HIGHWAY AND UTILITIES

Highway Division responded to average number (74) service calls which were either completed or scheduled for repair. Service calls for the month included mailbox repairs, sidewalk snow removal, dead animals, and icy roads. Staff went out to plow and treat for 15 winter events (48" of snow). A total of 8,937 yards of snow was removed. Crews removed Christmas lights and the City Christmas tree. Maintenance for the month involved pothole repair and traffic light repairs. The Fleet Maintenance division worked on minor maintenance on several vehicles. They also replaced the front spring on #55- a six wheel dump truck; replaced the back spring on #8-a six wheel dump truck.

The Utilities Division performed typical maintenance on the water and sewer systems, along with responding to 19 calls for service. We have been cleaning catch basins and culverts that are full of debris, crews continued to blow out water gates threw out the city, and continue with manhole inspections. The water and sewer crew has also been working at the Quonset hut installing and building new storage shelves for organizing the water and sewer inventory. We continue to do regular maintenance and cleaning of our troubled sewers. Staff repaired a water service on Orange Street. This is a very old line that will need to be replaced if we have continued breaking. A water service break at 126 Rochester Hill Road was repaired. The construction work load slowed just in time for the snow to hit. The Utilities staff all have a role in the plowing and snow removal operations. Both the meter technician and the meter reader run sidewalk tractors and all equipment operators drive a plow route.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

Other than the regular maintenance, the grounds guy's have taken down all the Christmas wreaths from all the buildings as well as keeping up with the snow storms and keeping the walkways clean of snow and ice. In preparation of Bourques Flooring coming in to replace the City Clerks carpets, the maintenance staff came in on January 17, 18, and 19 to remove furniture, old carpeting and VCT tiles. Staff has removed snow drifts from the roof of the Community Center and of all building entrances. Staff completed quarterly inspections of the air filters in all the buildings and completed monthly inspections on all the emergency lighting and exit signs. The issues with the new roof top heater on the gym at the community center resolved and all is working well.

WATER TREATMENT PLANT

Treated water volume for the month of January 2014 was approximately 52.3 million gallons from the surface water treatment plant and 2.0 million gallons from groundwater. All water quality testing and monitoring was completed in accordance with NHDES requirements. We are pleased to report that the City of Rochester again met and exceeded all State and Federal standards for drinking water.

Equipment and grounds maintenance was performed at the WTF, well, and tanks/stations, and inspections conducted within the watershed and structures. Our domestic water pumps at the plant required repair to the pressure switches; the upstream flow meter bubbler assembly was exchanged and returned for diagnosis; signal and telemetry issues have improved with the inhouse replacement of the main router.

Daily water demand has accommodated several successful overnight pumping periods for the well. Extreme wind and temperatures froze several sensing lines at the remote stations which were repaired or replaced as needed. Snow cleanup has been significant. We are trialing the use of a streaming current monitor to determine the feasibility of implementing coagulant and pH trimming with the chemical feed system upgrade. The 2014 CCR is being drafted in house and should be completed for the beginning of February. Submittal review and materials procurement has progressed, and mobilization for the upgrade project is expected at the beginning of next month. The WTP Staff thanks Director Nourse for his leadership, mentorship, and positive vision, and wish him the very best at his new position.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY

Staff continues to work with the coalition of communities on related wastewater and Great Bay Estuary issues. Staff attended State of NH sponsored UST training course and tested for recertification. Staff replaced faulty level transducer at Autumn St Pump station. Staff has been working with DPW on 61 Chamberlain St. oil remediation project. The alum sludge has been stock piled in lagoon #3 for removal in the spring. We continue to work out the bugs created by the SCADA system software upgrade. WWTP has also been busy with snowplowing and shoveling at the Facility and pump stations. Staff performed preventative and corrective maintenance on equipment, machinery and instrumentation. All required testing for the EPA and State has been completed and submitted. Average effluent flow for the month = 3.122 Million Gallons per Day (MGD). Percent of Design Flow = 62.1%. Precipitation = 5.58".

ENGINEERING

CIP:

- Catherine-Sheridan-Knight Road and Utility Reconstruction project Work has been suspended till spring.
- Stillwater Circle Bridge Repairs: Work complete.
- Chesley Hill Road Reconstruction: Design nearly complete with construction in 2015. Bid Opening in February.
- Strafford Square Roundabout: Federal funding not available until Federal Fiscal Year 2016 (Oct 2015). DOT has authorized award to Fay, Spofford and Thorndike to begin design.
- Wakefield Street Reconstruction: Design underway. Construction funding will be sought in FY16.
- EDA Crossroads Water and Sewer: Design underway. Anticipate construction in summer. Public Works Committee was briefed on various design options.
- FY15 Paving: Complete. No holdovers into the Spring. Public Works Committee has been given a draft FY16 Roadwork Plan to review.
- Salmon Falls Rd. HSIP Curve Softening project: Working with residents to resolve temporary and permanent construction easements. Future of this project uncertain due to challenges with securing multiple abutter permission for the roadwork.
- Sidewalks: Work to resume in Spring.
- Milton Road Corridor Analysis: Analysis started in August. To be presented to Public Works Committee in February.
- Granite Ridge Public Outlay: Bids for public infrastructure open on 26 January.

- Franklin St.-Western Ave.-Adams Ave. Road and Utility Reconstruction: Design underway. Construction to start in summer 2015. Western Ave./First St. Pump Station Replacement has been rolled into this project. This project is recommended to be split into a base contract which would rebuild the Western Ave sewer pump station and rebuild Franklin St. and, an alternate to rebuild the roadway and utilities in 1st-5th Streets, Western and Adams Avenues. Additional funding programmed for FY16.
- Rt. 125 Pump Station: On-site work has started. Progress of contractor is slow.
- Surface Treatment Water Plant Upgrades: Work to commence in February and to be completed in summer 2015.
- City Hall Annex: City Council continues to evaluation options.
- Colonial Pines Sewer / Wastewater Interceptor Upgrades: Design underway 2014 2015. Construction funds to be sought in FY16-18 budgets.
- Howard Brook Culverts Replacement: Anticipate construction in spring 2015.
- DPW Facility Study: DPW approached Fairgrounds Board to see if they would be interested in selling a portion of the Fairgrounds to the City for use as the potential future DPW site.
- Round Pond Expansion: No action in December.

Other:

- DPW populated the new CIP module for FY16 and out years through FY20. DPW produced FY16 operation and maintenance budgets.
- DPW participated in AFSCME contract negotiations.
- Rochester provided a proposed implementation plan to EPA to address their conditions in exchange for additional time before permit issuance. EPA approved the plan.

Continuing to follow the goals of our Master Plan, consistent evaluation and evolution of department marketing takes place on a daily basis. Our Program Coordinator has collaborated with the Rochester Times to create a weekly posting titled "Happenings at Rochester Recreation & Arena". This excerpt highlights rec programs and events and gives recaps to the past week's rec sports. Multiple patrons have dropped into our programs stating that they read about these opportunities in the Rochester Times.

Programs designed to appeal to family units have gained exceptional popularity in January. Parent Child Open Gym hosted 402 children and parents this past month. Children ranging from infants to preteens gathered in the gymnasium for physical activity and socialization. This two hour, twice a week program also gives parents and guardians the opportunity to get out of the

house and socialize with other caregivers. Public Ice Skating continues to maintain strong numbers with 368 skaters attending sessions at the Rochester Arena in January. From children to seniors, Public Ice Skating brings in a diverse crowd of ages and abilities. Many patrons have commented on the new bleachers and bathrooms at the arena and how they have improved their skating experience.

Senior Programming remains very strong. Monday morning Senior Yoga has quickly gained a strong following. Each week we continue to meet new seniors who have read about this program in the news paper or had it recommended to them through word of mouth. Social networking has become evident through all of our senior programming, as our participants have formed new friendships and connections through attending recreation programs.

January Teen Night was a large success. Two hundred and twenty five 12-17 year olds attended last month. Recreation and Police Department staff provided supervision and interaction with participants, including but not limited to arts and crafts, basketball, dodge ball, music and dancing. Teen Night participants have also been taking advantage of Teen Night's Licensed Alcohol and Drug Counselor. On an average Teen Night upwards of 50 teens will stop in to visit the LADC, chat with her and take part in her peer counseling sessions. Not only does our LADC focus on preventing substance abuse, but she guides teens in confidence building and healthy decision making.
