

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION: Recently altered from its original Victorian appearance, the facade of the First National Bank is now characterized by contemporary Colonial motifs, including multi-paneled windows topped by ornamental keystones, a denticular cornice at the roofline and an eliptical fan window over the first story central entry. The brick veneer was applied over the former wooden facade. RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT: This building stands between 2 other commercial blocks on South Main Street. BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION: (LOT SIZE) 35 X 40 REFERENCES: Rochester History Advisory Committee STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations): The First National Bank is one of three adjoining commercial structures on South Main Street adjacent to Central Square that are of pivotal importance to maintaining the historic scale and visual context of the square. ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Ainslie's is a 3-story, 4-bay brick building notable for its bowfront facade. The first two stories date C.1832. The third story, added in 1881, compliments the structure's original Federal Style design. Evidence of the third story addition can be seen in the slight variation in brick color between first and second stories.

On the first story, the present storefront dates to the early twentieth century, although the basic design may date to 1881. The storefront has a recessed central entry flanked by plate glass display windows. They are topped by multi-light transoms. Brick piers framing the storefront support a curving granite lintel which spans the facade. There is also a bracketed cornice above the storefront level.

On the upper stories, the windows have 2/2 sash set in molded wooden surrounds contained within shallow reveals in the brickwork. The windows are topped by granite splayed lintels with a slightly tooled surface. The windows have wooden sills. Above the third story windows there is a single course of corbelled brick. The roofline is accented by a projecting bracketed cornice.

Ainslie's is the first in a group of three adjoining buildings on South Main Street. These buildings, and the McDuffee Block across the street, frame the entrance to Central Square.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

Ainslie's Drug Store is a bow-front, brick building unusual in its interpretation of architectural forms generally associated with urban townhouse design. Although the exact to the of construction has not been firmly documented, the structure was standing in 1832 on Dominicus Hanson opened his Apothecary Shop. Period accounts describe Hanson's establishment as a "Prim pressed brick, two story Apothecary store, with a circular front, once the most stylish store in the whole state of New Hampshire."

Hanson's store may pre-date 1832. Bow fronts and splayed lintels were made pupular in Boston during the Federal Period (1780-1820), by Charles Bulfinch - and Ainslies displayed both, as documented by daugerreotype from C.1860. R. Dewitt Burnham was responsible for the 1881 addition. At that time the present cornice formed a base for an elaborate victorian stepped parapet which has since been removed. Arthur Ainslie bought the business C.1920 and is probably responsible for the handsome pier and lintel storefront which still survives today. Ainslie's is extremely significant both architecturally and historically, and great care should be taken for its preservation.

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Granite State Savings Bank is a rectangular, three story Georgian Revival commercial block. Located on a main intersection, it has two primary elevations which meet at a canted corner.

The second story windows in the main bays are topped by brick flat arches with keystones which serve as the building's main ornamentation. A pressed metal block cornice and wide architrave mark the roofline. Former entry bays are highlighted on the upper stories by brick quoins.

A textured granite venneer has been applied over much of the first story at the expense of the storefronts and original arched entry openings. Only the storefronts on the ends of the building (which have polished black marble bases) remain intact. Contemporary signage conceals the original multi-light transoms.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT:

The building occupies a prominent corner location in the center of the business district.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

Formerly known as the Realty Block, the Granite State Bank building was a speculative venture of the Rochester Realty Company. The company was founded by a group of ten local businessmen whose motivation was to provide additional office and commercial space for Rochester merchants. The investors each put up \$5,000 to finance construction. The Realty Block has seen continuous commercial/office use since its completion in 1926.

The architect for the building was Albert K. Dow, from Tuftonborough Corner, N.H..

Historically this site was the location of the Dominicus Hanson house. Hanson was a key figure in Rochester during the nineteenth century.
