ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

This typical turn-of-the-century 3 story business block exhibits many features of late Victorian commercial architecture. The primary ornamentation consists of elaborate brick corbelling along the facade's roofline. Two brick stringcourses and offset brick piers on either side also ornament the facade.

Vermiculated limestone sills and rock-faced limestone lintels on the upper story windows provide a contrast in color and texture to the smooth brick walls, a treatment commonly seen on commercial buildings of this period. The eight bay facade is characteristically symmetrical, and within the upper stringcourse is a place for an inscription stone, since removed.

On the storefront level, a sign architrave (presently covdred by aluminum) spans the three storefronts which have all been altered.

The aluminum cladding may conceal a cast iron post on the southeastern corner.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT:

This is one of two adjoining late Victorian commercial blocks anchoring the northern end of the streetscape.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

The Elm Block C.1900, is significant to the downtown streetscape as one of the two (Hartigan Block) major commercial blocks built at the north end of North Main Street. It characterizes late Victorian Commercial Blocks. Notable features include the arched corbeling at the roofline. The original storefronts, which are presently concealed by aluminum, may still be intact.

For a time (approx. 1930-60) the Elm Block housed the Rochester Grange and was known as the Grange Block.
