

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The brick store is a massive looking 2½ story Greek Revival style commercial block dating C. 1825. Constructed of brick, it is typically oriented gable-end to the street. The roofline is emphasized by a heavy wooden architrave and corbelled brick cornice returns, which also lend to the building's heavy, massive scale a typical characteristic of Greek Revival architecture. The wooden architrave may obscure additional brick corbelling. Significantly, the building retains its slate roof that is historically correct roofing material.

The tripartite window in the gable end, topped by a granite lintel, is the only original window opening left on the facade.

The two rectangular windows on the second story are an early twentieth century alteration to the originally 4 bay wide design. The storefront level has been more recently modernized.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT:

The building is an important element of the grouping of commercial blocks surrounding Monument Square.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

Rochester's last remaining commercial block from the Greek Revival period, the brick store indicates the early nineteenth century appearance and scale of the commercial district.

Because of its gable end orientation to the street the brick store enhances the visual diversity of the streetscape.

Erected to house the dry goods business of the Chase family, it was later run by Charles K. Chase, son of the original merchant.

Simon Wolfs clothing store occupied the building after 1926. It later became the Peoples Market, its most commonly remembered name today.

In 1878 the building was substantially rebuilt after a major fire.
