

## ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Originally, the Lyman house was a symmetrical 5 bay cape dating to the early nineteenth century. Its age is suggested by its foundation of cut granite blocks.

The present appearance of the house relates to a circa 1920-30 rebuilding in the Colonial

Revival style.

The  $2\frac{1}{2}$  story house has a gambrel roof which extends over an enclosed porch on the north elevation. A 3 bay shed dormer is symmetrically placed over the whole composition. The foremost Colonial Revival feature is the slightly officenter entry, located in the center bay of the original house. The entry features a gabled portico over a door flanked by  $\frac{1}{2}$  sidelights and topped by a blind fan.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

The Lyman house is a good example of twentieth century Colonial Revival architecture, although it is actually an enlargement of an early nineteenth century cape. Its architectural features indicate it was sympathetically redesigned and rebuilt in the twentieth century.

Betsy Pinkam Lyman, owner of the original house was a teacher in the Rochester schools.

The house was rebuilt C.1925 by the Linscott family who lived in the large Colonial Revival house next door.
