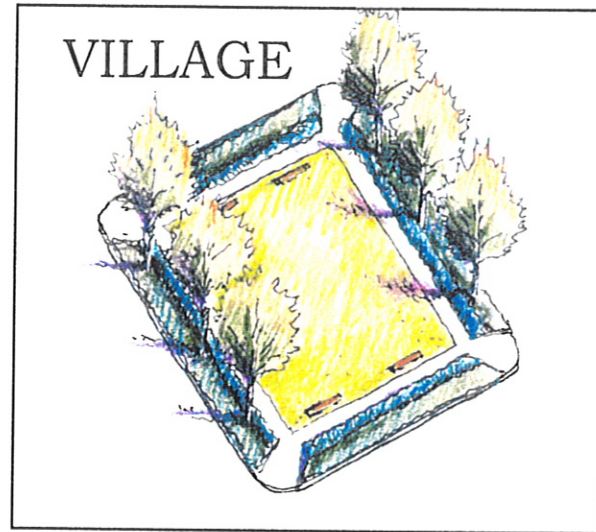


## Parks and Public Space

The landscape master plan can be understood as being composed of an array of public spaces or Park Types.

The diagrams show the basic components of the public park spaces proposed for the Village of Clark Brook. Each park will be joined together by pedestrian ways and streets to form a cohesive network of public spaces.



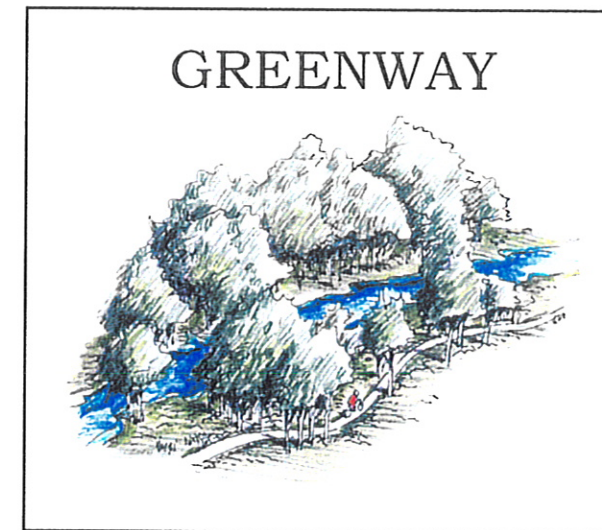
### VILLAGE PARK

These are well maintained and cultivated urban parks that provide places of public participation, recreation and relaxation in the center of the community. They constitute the village center that forms the nucleus of the village. The design of these parks tends to be ordered and formal contributing to the structure of the town village center



### TRANSITIONAL PARKS

These parks are connected, directly or by pedestrian ways, to the other village parks. They provide connection between the more formal Village Parks in the central village and the wild nature on the periphery.



### GREENWAY

The Greenway system is structured around the existing forested wetland system and weaves in and around the Village. It represents the most cohesive segment of wild nature in the community and provides corridors for wildlife passage and pedestrian trails. There are multiple connections to the greenway system from the Village with the primary access points at the transitional parks.
