**RE:** Department Logo Creation Process

A while back you asked me to provide some background information on the Recreation & Arena Logo that it has now gathered some traction popularity as being used by more departments with the use of the "R" within the logo.

**January of 2014:** Our department started the process of reviewing our department name and associated logos to be more reflective of what we do. Our Master Plan also suggested that this would be a good way to rebrand ourselves as a department. Assistant Director Lauren Krans initiated this process and started to reach out to different agencies, internally and externally, to see how they went about this process. Assistant Director Krans also attended a Marketing Workshop hosted by the Rochester Chamber of Commerce and was introduced to a firm from Berwick, Maine called Ace Your Image. After some initial meetings with Ace Your Image, department staff sat down collectively along with the Recreation & Arena Commission to further discuss ideas and options for generation of a new logo and name.


**April of 2014:** A survey went out on social media and email blasts to customers and to our Advisory Commission for further feedback and vision for our logo. Assistant Director Krans put together a summary briefing along with specific department information and history and sent it off to Ace Your Image. With many "back and forths" of logos and design options discussed, a final amount of 10 logo variations were generated for consideration.

**August-September of 2014:** The foundation of the main part of the logo with the now recognizable "R" was finalized through department staff and commission input. Staff worked out final design and layout along with specific colors and fonts.

**October of 2014:** Our logo was born!

## SUMMARY STATEMENT

The City Council in FY2006 appropriated \$50,000 for a "Riverwalk Study." The relevant CIP Budget Book page can be viewed here: <u>Riverwalk FY2006 Appropriation</u>. The study was completed expending \$27,488.63, leaving \$22,511.37 unexpended. The study can be viewed here: <u>Riverwalk 2007 Plan</u>. The City Council then de-authorized the unexpended funds and returned them to the Economic Development Reserve Fund. The Riverwalk Committee now requests that the City Council appropriate an amount equaling the prior unused funds for the purpose of a Master Plan Update and walking path improvements beginning in Hanson Pines.

## **RECOMMENDED ACTION**

Appropriate the requested \$22,511 from ED fund for the purpose of a Riverwalk Master Plan Update as well as walking path improvements beginning in Hanson Pines.

## June 2017 Monthly Report


For the month of June Code Compliance dealt with 50 properties that had compliance or zoning issues for a total of 57 documented issues. All of property owners in these cases received either a Courtesy Notice or a formal Notice of Violation asking for them to bring their property into compliance, of the 50 properties 18 of them have been closed and have come into compliance, 16 have been escalated and resulted in formal violations, 4 have been sent courtesy letters, and there are 12 open cases under investigation.




## **Dog Licensing**



## ROCHESTER DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS MONTHLY REPORT FOR JUNE 2017

The Department of Public Works responded to 187 requests for Service in the month of June. The Highway Division had 56 requests that ranged from brush trimming and traffic signal maintenance to pothole patching and drainage repairs. The Utilities Division responded to 41 requests that included water pressure concerns, manhole structure maintenance and calls for water and sewer service connection inspections. The Buildings and Grounds Division had 90 requests which included ceiling tile repairs, plumbing and electrical issues and many requests for restocking of supplies.




## HIGHWAY, FLEET MAINTENANCE AND UTILITIES

- Supported WWTP staff in the cleaning of Siphons at Old Dover Rd. & Congress St.
- Jetting and Vacuuming of Problematic Gravity Systems (*Weekly*)
- Pavement patches were compled for excavation sites on Olde Farm Lane., Wakefield St., Leonard St., Bernard St. & Willey St.
- Staff has been exercising of Gate Valves: Leonard St., Woodman St., Davyanne Locke Ln., Myrtle St. Charles St., Congress St., Liberty St.
- Cut, cap & abandon former cross country water main running between Olde Farm Ln. & Summer St. in order to better the water quality.
- Several Curb Stop Repairs were completed
- 1 hydrant repair was completed
- 2 water Gate Valve Repairs were completed
- Replaced leaking valve within exterior meter pit at 606 Salmon Falls Rd.

## **BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS**

- Mowing and trimming all parks, buildings and roadsides is completed on weekly and biweekly schedules throughout the city.
- Installed new carpeting in Strafford Regional Planning space at the Community Center
- Installed new stair treads in the stairwell at the Community Center

### WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY

Ryan Schafer who is the laborer at the WWTP passed the Grade 1 Wastewater Treatment Facility Operator certification exam. Chris Goodwin, who was a Wastewater Treatment plant Operator, has left the City to take a position with Waste Management as Chief Operator of the leachate facility. William Washok has been promoted from the Pump Station Maintenance position into the vacated operator position. The City continues to work with the coalition of communities on related wastewater and Great Bay Estuary issues. The plant staff worked with industries on various issues pretreatment issues. The two week commissioning period of Western Avenue pump station has begun, the City will resume responsibility for this pump station starting July 3<sup>rd</sup>. Staff attended State sponsored training classes. The River Street pump station design is at 60%. A tour of our facility was given to Keene wastewater officials. The annual cleaning of the River Street and Old Dover Road siphons was completed. Senior staff attended a meeting with EPA and DES to review ongoing City efforts. The draft permit issuance is tentatively scheduled for the end of summer to mid fall. We are working with HACH reps on repairs to our effluent DO probe. NHDES took influent and effluent samples to test for PFOA's. Staff is working with NH Dam Bureau on classification of Pickering Ponds walking trail Dam's. NHDES underground storage tank inspection was completed and there are repairs needed for compliance with new regulations. All required testing for EPA and the State has been completed and submitted. Staff performed preventative and corrective maintenance on equipment, machinery and instrumentation. Average effluent flow for the month was 3.581 million gallons per day (MGD). Percent of design flow = 71.2%. Percent of design flow for 2017 = 79.6%. Precipitation for the month = 2.79". Precipitation for 2017 = 24.52".

### WATER TREATMENT PLANT

The treated water volume for the month of June was approximately 51 million gallons from the surface water treatment plant and 16 million gallons from the well. All water quality testing and monitoring was completed in accordance with NHDES requirements. Treatment and distribution system optimizations have successfully improved disinfection byproducts for the second quarter of 2017. We are pleased to report that the City of Rochester again met and exceeded all State and Federal standards for drinking water. The watershed inspections were conducted on Tufts Pond, Berry Pond, Whaleback ponds, Berry Dam, both legs of the raw water transmission main, and the Cocheco wellhead. Watershed stream gages were inspected and flow curves were calibrated. All reservoirs remain filled to capacity; we measured approximately 2.9" of rainfall at the Reservoir. Raw water monitoring of pH, dissolved oxygen, conductivity, and colors was performed. Organic concentrations have reached 5.0 mg/L. We are optimizing our conditioned raw water chemical doses to maximize natural organic matter (NOM) removal and organic acidification. Equipment and grounds maintenance was performed at the plant, well, and tanks/stations. Upgrades to Industrial Way pump station have been completed. The new controls and surge arrestor are online. Repairs to the Cocheco well blowers and VFDs are complete. Maintenance at the water treatment facility included repairs to the treated caustic feed pump, fluoride analyzer, domestic plumbing, and blow-off building exhaust fan. the phone system upgrades; and inspection and cleaning of the clearwell. A break in the intake screen air line was located. Repairs are underway. Final cleanup and silt fence removal at the East End Dam was performed. Engineering for the Low Lift Pump Station project continues. The 2016 Water Quality Report was produced in-house and posted online this month. Hardcopies were

delivered to public locations. Staff attended an NHWWA technical meeting at Pennichuck Water Works and an NHDES Cyanobacteria workshop in Concord.

#### ENGINEERING

- **Surface Water Treatment Plant Upgrades**: Construction is substantially complete. Final items to be completed in the next month.
- Salmon Falls Road/Milton Road Water and Sewer (EDA Project): Construction of sewer and water infrastructure continues. Project completion is scheduled for early fall of 2017.
- Franklin St./Western Ave. Area Improvements: Construction continues on Western Avenue and the numbered streets for water, sewer, and drainage infrastructure. The new Western Avenue Sewer Pump Station was put into service on June 19, 2017.
- **Colonial Pines Sewer Extension**: The construction project including pipe-jacking a sewer under the Spaulding Turnpike from Railroad Ave. to Birch Dr. began in April. Construction will continue into the fall. Funding of future phases of this multi-phased sewer extension program have been included in the CIP budget over the next few years.
- Salmon Falls Rd. HSIP Curve Softening Project: Construction of this project was completed in June 2017.
- **Pavement Maintenance & Rehabilitation:** The recent Pavement Condition Assessment included a 5-year proposed program that was presented to the Public Works & Buildings Committee (PWC) in May 2017. Paving proposed for FY18 includes the following streets: Wakefield, Myrtle, Woodman, City Hall Municipal Parking Lot, Dry Hill, Eastern, Lagasse, Wilfred, Chestnut, Irish, Osborne, Scott, Pray, Lisa, and Stonewall. Paving of additional streets will be discussed at the next PWC meeting.

- Columbus Avenue (Rte. 125) Pedestrian Bridge: The new pedestrian bridge was opened in February 2016. Temporary sidewalk approaches to the bridge are planned to be replaced with more permanent sidewalk and railings. This project was advertised for bids and bids were received in May; however, only one bid was received. DPW is considering how to complete the construction.
- **Dewey Street Pedestrian Bridge:** A project to replace the bridge structure was advertised for bids in March. A supplementary appropriation was approved in June to cover a budget shortfall. The construction project was then awarded and construction is anticipated in begin in the summer months and extend into the fall of 2017.
- **Strafford Square Roundabout**: Design continues. Bidding of the roundabout construction contract is now anticipated for late 2017, with a spring 2018 construction start date. Prior to that contract, a utility infrastructure contract is anticipated to be bid in 2017 for construction prior to the roundabout contract.
- **Howard Brook Culverts Replacement**: Design, permitting, and easement negotiations to be finalized. Re-evaluating project need.
- Woodman St./Myrtle St. Area Improvements: Final design of this project has been put on hold. Project scope includes: Woodman St., Myrtle St., Davyanne Locke Ln., Ela Ct., Beaudoin Ave., and portions of Charles St. and Congress St. Areas also being considered for a potential bid alternates include Academy St., Liberty St., and other portions of Charles St.
- Wakefield Street Reconstruction: Final design of this project has been put on hold. Project scope includes Wakefield Street between Union Street and the Chestnut Hill Road Connector. Areas also being considered for potential bid alternates include Pleasant St., Orchard St., and Glenwood Ave. Design includes the option of transferring overhead utilities to underground in the project area.
- Water Treatment Plant Low Lift Pump Station Upgrade: Design has begun. This project is scheduled to be advertised for bids in 2017.
- **Lowell Street Culvert:** Drainage improvements in the area, improvements to the riprap slope on the southeastern side of the culvert, roadway paving in the area, and guardrail replacement in the area of the culvert were all completed in 2016. Further improvements to the culvert are being contemplated for possible future construction. Consulting engineering recommendations are anticipated in the coming months.
- Wastewater Interceptor Upgrades: A Basis of Design Report has been received from the design consultant. This report summarizes alternatives and recommends a sewer collection system master plan before proceeding with final design.
- NPDES Permit Wastewater & MS4 Permit Stormwater: The draft NPDES Permit for the Wastewater Treatment Facility has not yet been issued by USEPA Region 1, however issuance could happen at any time. As far as the MS4 Permit for stormwater, the new NH Small MS4 General Permit was issued by USEPA Region 1 on January 18, 2017; the Permit becomes effective on July 1, 2018. Both USEPA Region 1 and NHDES have conceptually proposed the idea of an integrated permit, combining the WWTF NPDES Permit and the MS4 Stormwater Permit.

**Representing the City – RECON Convention, Las Vegas, NV-** Rochester was represented at the Annual International Council of Shopping Centers Real Estate Convention by Manager Pollard, Specialist Marsh and Susan DeRoy, Chair of the Rochester Economic Development Commission. The trio attended multiple meetings with potential investors, developers and retailers. Intense follow up continued during June with multiple meetings and phone calls. Three prospect

meetings resulted so far. More are likely.

**Rochester Housing Forum** – A Rochester Housing Forum was held on June 20<sup>th</sup> and Manager Pollard was one of the featured speakers. A few of the critical points were that job creation is far exceeding housing creation and has for the past five years. The current housing shortage is putting a stranglehold on businesses that want to expand and the low unemployment rate is affecting businesses considering moving to the area. The Forum was well attended by housing agencies and those non-profits dealing with homelessness and low-income housing. We did have a small number of housing developers but had hoped for a more. The Rochester Housing "Huddle" is a monthly meeting of people interested in all types of housing issues.

<u>Granite State Business Park Expansion</u> – The department is marketing two large parcels of industrial land at the Granite State Business Park. The 47 acre "front" parcel that abuts Innovation Drive and Route 108/Rochester Hill Road has had the zoning changed to Industrial and has been included in the TIF District for the park. The demolition permit for the barn removal has been approved and it is being relocated for preservation. Just becoming available in July is the 50 acre parcel to the north of Safran's 345,000 square foot LEAP Engine building. This very buildable parcel is being considered for a regional distribution center but could also be subdivided for multiple users as well. The HM Machine parcel has been reduced in price and there is a serious offer in the works for that 40,000 square foot construction to move forward with a manufacturer as the lead investor.

<u>Granite Ridge TIF District</u> – Waterstone's Phase II revisions are nearing completion and they have been having meetings with various stakeholders. The theater and restaurants are still very prominent however the DES and EPA have significantly reduced the gross leasable area (GLA) of the Phase II parcels. This has caused Waterstone to look at partnerships with other property owners in what could be called a "Phase III" development opportunity under consideration and study. It is likely that Waterstone will meet publicly for discussions in July and August. Phase III may also invite a zoning update to the Granite Ridge Development District Zone which is part of ongoing discussions with staff.

<u>Strategic Planning</u>-RKG Associates is nearing completion of the Economic Development Chapter of the Master Plan. The REDC and staff offered feedback on draft goals and objectives supplied by Craig Seymour and his team. Final report expected in late-July for a possible September review and adoption by the Rochester City Council.

<u>Attraction Signage –</u> NHDOT last responded April 3, 2017 on the Attraction Sign Applications. We continue to follow up to get cost estimates for installing these signs at Spaulding Turnpike Exits 12 through 16.

**Way Finding** Beta Group has been doing an excellent job on the Wayfinding Project and met with the committee on June 6<sup>th</sup>, although the presentation to City Council was cancelled. The will meet with the committee again in early August and will be nearing completion at that time. We will be planning a Workshop presentation to the City Council once all the data is complete.

<u>Commute SMART Campaign</u>— May was the CommuteSMART Challenge and Bike Month. Our Rochester Employee Team doubled in size in 2017, and also increased the per person trips and mileage this year. Co-captains Karen Pollard and Celeste Plaia held a debrief meeting with Ann Rugg of Commute SMART Seacoast and came up with some fun ideas for next year. One opportunity for the City Employees is to have opportunities to get together through the winter. There will be a Winter Commute Challenge again in 2018.

<u>Bike Share Research</u> – The Department was contacted by Zagster, the provider of bike share services in Portsmouth and Manchester, as well as cities across the U.S. Two phone conversations were held and we were joined by Chris Bowlen and Lauren Krans of RAYS. It was decided to continue research into bike sharing by looking into other companies as well as contacting Portsmouth and Manchester for their feedback on Zagster. Bike sharing has become increasingly popular in urban areas and is now finding its way to suburban areas as another form of recreation and a way to connect community destinations, such as parks, community centers and Downtown venues. Rochester may be a good location for a small-scale pilot program for bike sharing.

<u>ED Suite Online Proposal System</u> – The website upgrade included a Proposal Suite upgrade at no additional charge. This allows staff to prepare prospect proposals that are hosted online, and that can include data on our website as well as data or commentary that we upload specifically for that prospect. The prospect is given a security code and can access the online data from anywhere, including at the critical real estate meetings held at corporate. We receive a notice every time they look at the proposal, and can follow up with additional info as it becomes available.

**Northeast Economic Developers Association** – The Board of Directors met in June and Manager Pollard is an Executive Committee Member as Secretary. The meeting was held in Lowell and no hotel costs were incurred. A training session on University Incubators and Economic Development Partnerships was offered prior to the Board Meeting.

<u>38 Hanson Street</u> – Acquisition is still pending with environmental testing taking place in June. A new addendum to the purchase and sale was signed with an expected closing date of August 15, 2017.

Office staff attended the State of the State held at Cocheco Country Club in Dover. The Governor spoke about reducing regulations on business, decreasing the state corporate tax burden and lowering the cost of electricity and health care.

The first annual Dinner on the Riverwalk took place with approximately 70 dinners. This was an event to raise awareness of our beautiful river and the Riverwalk that runs along the river downtown. The event will take place next year as well and the Main Street Board will decide if this should be a once or twice a year event.



<u>Tri-City Co-op – Handicap Ramp and HVAC projects:</u> This project is now complete. <u>Homeless Center for Strafford County – Generator Project:</u> No bids were received for this

project. The Community Development Coordinator has worked with HCSC and the Business Office to draft a new project description document to send to the contractors who attended the site walkthrough to encourage them to submit bids. These contractors will have two weeks in which to submit a bid. It is anticipated that this project will begin and conclude in early FY 2017-2018.

- <u>Rochester Main St. Façade Program</u>: The façade restoration at the Performing Arts Center has started, and the Community Development Coordinator has started Davis-Bacon site monitoring for the project. Photographs of the awning removal are attached to this report. It is anticipated that this project will conclude in early FY 2017-2018.
- FY 17-18 CDBG Annual Action Plan
- <u>FY 17-18 Plan Draft</u>: The City of Rochester has received its FY 2017-2018 grant allocation from HUD in the amount of \$265,965.00. This provides \$53,193 for planning/administration, \$39,894.75 for public service agencies, and \$172,877.25 for housing rehab/public facilities. A revised version of the approved FY 2017-

2018 CDBG Annual Action Plan and revised grant application summary documents have been drafted. The revised action plan is available online at

https://www.rochesternh.net/sites/rochesternh/files/uploads/fy\_17-18\_rochester\_cdbg\_aap\_v10.pdf. Included in the revisions is a proposal to use \$2,500 of planning/administration funds to provide the local matching funds for the Planning Department's New Hampshire Municipal Technical Assistance Grant.

- CDBG Program
- <u>FY 2016-2017 Site Monitoring</u>: The Community Development Coordinator has conducted site monitoring for all FY 2016-2017 CDBG subrecipients. There were no findings during any of the site monitoring visits; for a few subrecipients, financial best practices guidance was provided. Photographs taken of the new installed elevator at Community Partners are attached to this report.
- FY 2017-2018 Contracts: CDBG and general city funding contracts have been drafted and sent out to the FY 2017-2018 grant recipients. Most contracts have been signed and returned, and the Community Development Coordinator is following up on the few contracts still unsigned. Contract amendments will be sent to the CDBG subrecipients after the subrecipients' funding amounts have been adjusted in light of the FY 2017-2018 HUD grant allocation.
- <u>Assessment of Fair Housing</u>: The Community Development Coordinator has continued to meet and coordinate with the Rochester Housing Authority to work on the research and consultation phases of the Assessment of Fair Housing (AFH). The Community Development Coordinator has conducted nearly all of the required consultations and is continuing to schedule the few remaining consultations.
- Non-CDBG Grant Activities
- <u>Bridging the Gaps</u>: The Community Development Coordinator has met via phone with SAMHSA grant officials regarding the upcoming transition in the coalition coordination position. The Community Development Coordinator also participated on an interview panel interviewing candidates for the coalition coordinator position. A job offer should be made soon, at which point the Community Development Coordinator will submit Key Change in Personnel paperwork to SAMHSA for approval.
- <u>HUD Lead-Based Paint Hazard Control Program</u>: The City of Rochester has not yet received official word regarding its grant application, but the HUD press release announcing 2017 awards did not include the City of Rochester:

https://portal.hud.gov/hudportal/HUD?src=/press/press\_releases\_media\_advisories/2017/HUDNo\_17-049. New Hampshire Housing received a 2017 award, however, and specifically mentioned partnering with the City of Rochester in its project description. The Community Development Coordinator will schedule a debriefing once the official HUD rejection is received.

- <u>EPA Brownfields Grant:</u> The City of Rochester was not awarded an EPA Brownfields Grant. City Engineer Mike Bezanson will be scheduling a debriefing with the EPA regarding the grant application.
- <u>New Hampshire Municipal Technical Assistance Grant:</u> The City of Rochester has been awarded a NH Municipal Technical Assistance Grant award in the amount of \$10,000 for a project to research and revise the zoning ordinance as related to the downtown district, focusing on increasing allowed density. The revised FY 2017-2018 CDBG Action Plan proposes using \$2,500 in planning/administration funds for the NH Municipal Technical Assistance Grant's required local match.
- <u>VOCA Grant:</u> The City of Rochester has received its final VOCA continuation grant award for FY 2017-2018. The Community Development Coordinator has completed and submitted the required grant acceptance paperwork. The Legal Department is also in the process of hiring a new person to fill the victim-witness

advocate position. The Community Development Coordinator will prepare and submit the quarter four reports for this grant.

- <u>City Hall Annex</u>: The Community Development Coordinator is coordinating with LCHIP grant officials to schedule the required 50% completion site visit. The Community Development Coordinator is also preparing to submit the quarter four reports for the Moose Plate and Certified Local Government grants.
- <u>School Department</u>: At the request of Creteau Tech Center staff, the Community Development Coordinator researched potential funding options to fund an advanced manufacturing training program for Rochester high school students. The Community Development Coordinator has also reached out to workforce initiatives state agencies and partners and has helped arrange a meeting between these officials and Creteau Tech Center staff.
- Other Information
- <u>Housing Forum</u>: The Rochester housing forum, hosted by the Community Development Division, the Workforce Housing Coalition of the Greater Seacoast, and the Greater Rochester Chamber of Commerce, was held on June 20<sup>th</sup> and had about 50 persons in attendance. The forum included a variety of speakers, including Rochester Main Street and city staff, who discussed Rochester's housing needs and Rochester's vision for the future as related to housing and economic development. *Foster's Daily Democrat* published an article on the event which is available online at <u>http://www.fosters.com/news/20170620/forum-discusseshousing-issues</u>.
- <u>Solar Power Financing for Municipalities</u>: The Community Development Coordinator attended a seminar on solar power financing options for municipalities, hosted by the Regional Economic Development Center of Southern New Hampshire. #### PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORT FOR JUNE 2017

The Planning Board, Conservation Commission, and the Historic District Commission (HDC) all held their regular meetings in the month of June. The Arts & Culture Commission did not have a regular meeting in June but are preparing for the Rochester Art Awards in August. The discussions/agenda items from the regular meetings of the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, and the HDC are summarized below. It was another busy month for our volunteers.

In addition to their regular meeting the Planning Board held their workshop meeting on June 19, 2017. The Board's agenda did include some regular business and they discussed and held a public hearing for the Makris R.E. Development, LLC, Chesley Hill Road & Donald Street development proposal. The Board also reviewed the Table of Permitted Uses for the Office Commercial (OC) District and the Fairgrounds are located in the OC District. The Board was also given an update on surety and inspections. Once a developer has their project inspected by the City and it is determined that the project was completed according to the plans, the surety/performance guarantee is given back to the applicant with any interest that has accumulated. The Board also recommended appointing Donald Hamann as one of the City's representative to the Strafford Regional Planning Commission.

The Planning & Development Department was busy during the month of May. In addition to the meetings listed within this report, the Planning Staff attended variety of other meetings throughout the month of June. These include, but are not limited to the Strafford Metropolitan Planning Organization's Technical Advisory Committee, the City's Technical Review Group, various site visits for Planning Board approval follow-up, a preconstruction meeting for Coyote Creek, Codes & Ordinance Committee, NHDOT, meeting on Wings & Wheels, Rochester Rotary, Life Safety Committee meeting, the Self Directed IT team meeting, a Housing Forum at the Governors Inn, NH Planners Association Spring Conference (attended by Seth Creighton), Wayfinding Committee, a site walk with NHDES on Brock Street for National Guard project, IT Self Directed Work Team meeting, a meeting on E911, a site visit to Monarch School for Certificate of Occupancy, and various meetings with consultants, developers, citizens, and other City staff. The Planning & Development Department also held a department staff meeting in May. The Planning Board agenda for July will be busy with both new applications and continued applications. This will be the Board's only meeting in July. The Department has begun to review the applications and preparing them for hearings in July and August.

#### 6. Reports:

The Chairman explained that he and staff met with NH DES, NH DOT, US National Guard, and contractors for a preconstruction walk. He also visited the site again when tree cutting began. He reported that the contractors understood the limits of clearing and the need to protect vegetation along the shore of the brook.

#### MONTHLY REPORT JUNE 2017

On behalf of the Fire Department, I am pleased to provide you with the following report. It serves as a summary of the activities, projects and programs underway within the department.

#### **DEPARTMENT INFORMATION:**

During the month of June the Department responded to 253 calls for service. This represents a 13% increase from May with 224 runs, and an increase of 2% over last June at 248 calls. Of the calls this June, there were 6 building fires, one required a first alarm. That same fire also resulted in a fire fatality. Additionally there were 2 brush fires and one outside trash fire.

Crews responded to an additional 39 calls for vehicle accidents in June as well. Additionally there were 93 medical calls, with 18 of those calls being attributed to the opiate crisis. The overdoses represent no change from last month. For the fiscal year 2017 this department responded to 127 overdoses in Rochester. Of those 10 resulted in a fatality or almost 8%. The months of August in 2016 resulted in our busiest overdose month of the fiscal year with 21 occurring that month and 2 fatalities. Since that time May and June of 2017 have been next, both with 18 overdoses each and 1 fatality in May.

We also responded to 6 calls for mutual aid assistance. The remaining calls included everything from alarm activations, good intent calls, and public service calls, as well as a multitude of various other type calls.

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:**

Staff has been working on prioritizing policy changes to reflect the latest safety practices and procedures. Other administrative policies are being reviewed and updated to reflect changing trends and to stay current with all legal aspects.

As of this report all of our military personnel have been deployed or will be within the next week. Currently our department is short staffed six firefighters; four away on military leave

and two on light duty. We will be administering one shift transfer to accommodate for a small portion of this loss. We also expect to hire our newest firefighter in late July which will help to offset this shortage as well.

#### **FIRE PREVENTION:**

Fire Prevention continued its busy routine during the month of June with inspections, training, and education. Fire Marshal Wilder and D/C Powers both attended the NFPA Convention held in Boston this month which offered a wealth of knowledge into the codes we use day in and day out. We finished the final inspection on the first of four building housing 36 units located at Clark Brook and Starbucks completed their building at The Ridge as well. We issued 9 permits for fireworks this year and would only expect that number to rise as more people become educated on the ordinance changes. Our housing inspection program is still moving along and we are starting to see a lot of safety upgrades made to apartment buildings that have lacked necessary requirements for so long.

#### **DUTY SHIFT:**

#### Fire Department Training and EMS Division

#### Training

The shifts were provided with a training packet covering April, May and June, with the ability to schedule as appropriate.

The remaining lessons were taught as appropriate, including;

-Lifting a victim out of window

- -Carrying victims down ladders
- -Pump operations, pumping attack lines from the tank and relay pumping from a hydrant
- -Truck-1 Bucket, hose loads, deployment and breathing air operations
- -Video, "The Evolving Fireground"
- -Forestry-1, hose packs and pump operations

-Policy Review, GO EMRS-1, Passport Accountability System

-Firefighter line of duty death review, Buffalo New York, 2009

-EMS training covered Pediatric Emergencies

-Conducted after action reviews of the building fire at the High View on Rochester Hill Road.

-Call Force Training - Drilled on lifting victims to windows and carrying victims down ladders.

-Continued work on the Driver Operator Program

-Planned preparation for instruction in July

#### Operations

-Began development of a FF MAYDAY Checklist

-Began development of an Incident Command Checklist

-Assisted with administrative duties as needed and assigned

-Assisted with clearing up the budget and ensuring all purchases accounted for

-Managed vehicle maintenance

-Managed personnel leave and shift coverage

#### **EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT:**

A Shelter workshop scheduled for June 22nd was cancelled due to a conflict that Tory Jennison from Population Health Integrated Delivery Network had. This has been tentatively rescheduled for July 14<sup>th</sup>, but is contingent on school personnel availability for that date.

I continue to work with Lisa Clark from DPW to complete the grant in regards to the Fire Station Generator.

RE: Monthly Report – June 2017

**OPERATIONS**: Wards 1, 4, 5 and 6 met this period. Discussions included ways to prevent victimization and typical crimes seen during the summer. Code Compliance Officer Joe Devine talked about code violations, there was discussion on constructions projects around the City, the fact that there would be no city-sponsored fireworks this year, the fairgrounds and its future, and the hiring and training process. There was a discussion on forming a Police Athletic league. Over in Ward 5 was a discussion on seeing increased traffic on Little Falls Bridge Road; with a request for the speed trailer out there. In Ward 6 there was discussion on substance abuse, as well as a discussion on a local aggressive panhandler and what could be done. The speed trailer was deployed on Sampson Road for one week.

The investigations bureau had 38 cases sent from patrol for review or investigation. There are currently 88 cases assigned. There were 26 cases presented to the Grand Jury and all returned true bills. We logged in 358 pieces of evidence and returned 60 pieces. Det. Bourque analyzed 22 phones with the Cellebrite machine. There were three detective callouts this period all for unattended deaths. There were three backgrounds and one polygraph completed.

**COMMUNICATIONS:** We are officially at full staff. All in training have been released to solo headset. Our radio vendor found two bad receivers that have since been replaced, which has addressed an issue of spotty radio coverage.

**COMP STAT:** There has been a decrease in traffic stops, yet, some of the motor vehicle stops have yielded significant outcomes. Six stops were drug related, where arrests were made. Drugs found during these stops included marijuana, cocaine, methamphetamine, heroin and suboxone. In property crime we have identified a suspect related to the slashing of tires. There was also a robbery at Family Dollar and a suspect was taken into custody from that incident.

## \*\* There will not be a formal comp stat report until such time as we hire a new crime analyst. \*\*

**DIVERSION:** Teen Travel camp started on June 28 with a hiking trip and tour of the UNH campus. There are 20 youth signed up for the program. In additional to the Diversion and Recreation staff, the high school SRO and when available, the RMS SRO attend these camps. The planning for National Night Out on August 1<sup>st</sup> at the Commons is moving forward smoothly.

### PAUL R. TOUSSAINT Chief of Police





**HOUSING:** There were 27 police-related calls at the housing complexes. 16 backgrounds were conducted. Officer Funk reports the weekends are uneventful; he is building relationships through socializing with the residents.

**K9:** The K9 had 4 tracks and one drug search in town. The remainder of calls were out of town. The unit participated in a demonstration and training for the Civil Air Patrol, as well as a visit to the Chamberlain Street School.

**PROSECUTION:** In adult court this period there were 155 new cases with 229 charges. Of those there were 52 guilty pleas, 39 not guilty pleas and 40 failed to appear. Of the cases that went before the court there were 12 administrative guilty findings, 33 charges nol prossed as part of plea agreements, and 5 cases were dismissed by the Court. 45 cases were continued.

Juvenile prosecution had 3 arraignments, 3 review hearings and 1 emergency ex parte hearing involving placement. 8 trials were resolved with pleas. Lt. Gould also completed 14 warrants for compulsory attendance RSA 193:1.

**SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS:** School is out for the summer, and the SRO's have been assigned to patrol. On Wednesday's the HS SRO attends Teen Travel camp.

**ADMINISTRATIVE:** We have upgraded the modems in the cruisers to ensure connectivity with the City's new firewall. The firewall cutover presented some challenges for connecting the MDT's and IMC. MIS staff has been very responsive in resolving any issues that crop up.

Our annual bids for maintenance, clothing and car washes were opened on June 1<sup>st</sup>. We made recommendations on awarding the bids to the various vendors and they have been notified.

The bulk of the training this period centered on use of force annual certifications. Capt. Thomas attended the regional trainer of the FBI National Academy Associates in Rhode Island. Additionally training was received in blood-borne pathogens and incident command.

Recruits Robinson, Roy and Plumb are progressing well at the academy. Four new officers are slated to start in July. They will head off to the Academy at the end of August. This will be a big leap to addressing our staffing shortages.

**FORFEITURE SPENDING:** There was \$151.74 in forfeiture spending this period.

**EMD USE:** There were two Taser displays and no deploys this period.

### MONTHLY REPORT June 2017

There were a total of 16,266 items circulated with 11,866 people visiting the library in the month of June. Two hundred forty-six patrons used the library's Internet computers for 709 hours. Visitors to the library's web site numbered 12,531. Current number of patron registrations is 37,429. Interlibrary loan activity included 74 materials borrowed from other libraries and 290 loaned to other libraries.

The Summer Reading Program, "READ S'MORE BOOKS!" began Monday, June 26th and will run for six weeks. This reading program is a camping in the great outdoors theme including a plush campfire, tent, beaver, fox and many trees to hide summer reading program clues. All children 2 and up are welcome to participate regardless of their reading abilities or any other limitations. Our Children's room staff is ready and willing to help all children and young people to participate and be successful in the program.

The Library was proud to exhibit the work of Fred Hunter during the month of June. Fred creates his drawings, paintings and jewelry at MindsEye Designs, a vocational program in the creative arts at Community Partners. This visual arts program educates and supports the consumers in the work of making original art; through process and production. Artists engage in self-expression and active engagement in the greater community.

Wednesday, June 21<sup>st</sup> the library was pleased to present "Essential Oils 101" with lifestyle coach Cindy Simon. Patrons learned about the healing properties of essential oils, made aromatherapy sprays, created facial moisturizers, and bath soak salts to take home for everyday use.

The Rochester Public Library and the Rochester Museum of Fine Arts came together to host the first ever Rochester Independent Film Festival at the Rochester Opera House on the weekend of June 24<sup>th</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup>. The weekend long festival featured award winning independent films from around the globe. The films were streamed from a service called IndiFlix, an online streaming video site offered to card holding patrons of the Rochester Public Library. The purpose of this event is to highlight the benefits of IndiFlix and entice card-holders to utilize the free service.

In addition to the print versions of available books, 250 of our library patrons downloaded 1,345 e-books to media devices through the library's web site this month. The RPL website also enabled 29 patrons access to Mango Languages and 214 digital downloads from Hoopla and 148 songs were downloaded from Freegal Music.

#### SUMMARY STATEMENT

The Rochester Community Vibrancy Committee, which was formed after the First Impressions downtown project, is proposing to place donated, volunteer-painted pianos in the downtown as a community art project. Other communities in New Hampshire, such as the Town of Littleton, have done similar downtown projects. The project would start with placing one piano in front of the Rochester Performing Arts Center, with other possible piano locations being the Rochester Public Library and the River Walk. The pianos would have posted notices alerting users to cover the pianos when not in use and to observe quiet hours.

The proposed project was discussed at the July 2017 Community Development Committee meeting, and the Committee voted to support the project and recommend that City Council vote to support the project.

### **RECOMMENDED ACTION**

Allow the Rochester Community Vibrancy Committee to place painted pianos at select downtown locations during warm months.
